Building Maintenance Plumbing & Decorating WALBERSWICK REMEMBERED - DAPHNE GOODMAN (PORTRAIT SCULPTOR)

Many of us have fond memories of Daphne and Betty Goodman, who spent their later years at Old Post Office Cottage. This tiny cottage was steeped in timewarped charm and was crammed with bulky furniture, including a grand piano which they could not bear to part with when they moved from London. Jeremy, their cat, was lovingly cared for, but sulked if they went out - "Worse than a jealous husband" Betty claimed.

Once past eighty, Daphne, after a lifetime's devotion to music, but growing increasingly deaf, developed sculptural ambitions. Her particular interest was in portraiture, and her best was of Mr Bird of Blythburgh, who used to sell fish from a tradesman's bicycle at this time. She had been struck by his craggy features -"Such a handsome man" - and had persuaded him to sit for a portrait in her tiny kitchen.

Daphne's scuptural concerns lay not with form and mass, as is usual, but more with surface decoration. Ears, particularly, were a fascination, but eyebrows were grist to her mill too. With Mr Bird it was his Adam's apple. In the early stages of modelling he looked as if he had just swallowed a tennis ball, but as the head gained weight this feature fell back into proportion to some extent. The finished work, while a little crude in execution, was filled with enquiry and passion, without which no art can excite, and was truly a work of which she could be proud.

Daphne was an enthusiastic member of Leslie Scott's Saturday Modelling Group, in which Wally Webb had modelled a cat. Simplified in detail the cat was powerfully executed and possessed considerable sculptural presence. Daphne examined it carefully. "He's a very handsome cat", she said, "But what are you going to do about his whiskers?"

#### SHUTTLE SERVICE ?

How many people know the number of school age children living in the village and the effort and determination of the children themselves and parents to co-ordinate getting them to school and maintaining good home/school contact?

Buses are provided from the village to both Yoxford Primary School and Leiston Middle and High Schools. However these are not the only schools used. One major problem for parents of pre-school children is that there is no school Nursery in the catchment area. Hence two families regularly cycle their nursery age children over to Reydon school which has a lovely nursery. Both mums are losing weight rapidly and hopefully getting fit in the process (and one dad!) The same families also have children in the group of middle school age children now attending Halesworth Middle which is out of catchment. These children have to travel out of the village to pick up buses in Blythburgh and Reydon. One boy cycles to Reydon to pick the bus up and the rest are taken by car to Blythburgh by parents operating a rota to avoid several cars leaving the village at once! A number of parents are also actively involved in the schools as volunteers or have been governors.

The parents of the children at Halesworth are currently trying to get one of the Reydon buses re-routed into Walberswick. This would make life a lot easier and make opting for Halesworth a real choice for those with little or no transport.

#### MINSMERE BIRD RESERVE

On-shor: winds early in the month gave an insight into the birds at home on the North Eca. Pomarine skua(4), arctic skua(2),kittewake(63),gannet(20), common scoter(48), sooty shearwater(1), and red necked grebe(1) were all seen on November 3rd. Small parties of shorclarks (occasional) and snow buntings (regular) were found in the dunes and some very late migrants hurried through, with two swifts on the 8th and swallows on the 30th(!)

Apart from these, the most unusual bird of the month was a hawfinch spotted at the warden's bird table, which stayed for two days. Four of our resident bitterns were seen around the huge starling roost(up to 50,000 birds), giving rise to the suspicion that they may be picking sleeping starlings off the reeds or collecting dead birds from the ground under the roost. Wardens also carried out regular wildfowl, hen harrier roost and deer counts. with high numbers of red

## YOXFORD COUNTY PRIMARY SCHOOL - OFSTED INSPECTION REPORT

Parents, teachers and governors have just received a wonderful report from Ofsted. The inspectors said that the school was an orderly and vibrant community where pupils displayed a most positive attitude to teaching and learning. The inspectors saw the progress that pupils made during their time at school as a major strength of the school.

Standards in English, Maths, Science, Design Technology, Geography, History, Music and Art were all above average, This was a result of high quality teaching, which too was a major strength of the school. Of the lessons seen, every single one was sound and a stunning 85% were good or very good. The teachers were seen to have high expectations of their pupils. The inspectors thought that the staff at the school were a hard-working. committed and dedicated team.

A very high percentage of parents at Yoxford were seen to be very interested in the children's education and they gave the school great support. 100% of parents who responded to the inspection team's questionnaire agreed that their children enjoyed school. 100% found the school easy to approach. 100% also thought the school encouraged children to get involved in more that just their daily lessons.

We are no sconer coming to the end of the Christmas and Epiphany season than we find Lent around the corner.

Lent is a time for us to look afresh at our relationships with God and our neighbours. There are traditionally three elements to Lenten Discipline - prayer. study and charitable giving; this last may be linked to prayerful acts of fasting or self-denial. If we are to use Lent to prepare ourselves to celebrate better the great events of Holy Week and Easter then there really does need to be a spiritual element to whatever we do. We may decide to take extra care over our daily prayer life, to be more assiduous in our reading of the Bible, to forego a treat once a week and donate the money saved to a good cause, or to make a special effort to relate better to a friend or neighbour. #### NEWS FROM THE CHOIR

The Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols on Sunday December 21 proved the crown of the year for St Andrew's Church Choir, much augmented by friendly choristers from round about, who had also generously attended the additional rehearsals. Praise poured in from members of the congregation. Like the ohoristers, they had enjoyed an increasing repertoire throughout the year. During 1997 the choir sang 56 anthems including 17 new ones. They also led the congregation in 21 psalms and nearly 200 hymns. When the Rite A Communion Service was introduced on Advent Sunday they sang a new setting of the Agnus Dei by Richard Greening.

At the start of 1997 the choir had 15 regular members. Sadly a third of these can sing only on rare occasions owing to other duties and commitments. A recent bonus is the arrival of Alan and Sue Walpole now resident in the village but, as Sue is still Choir Master of Wenhaston Church Choir, she and Alan are unable to sing at St Andrew's on a regular basis. To continue in the choral tradition we need new singers urgently. If you are tempted, don't feel shy. It's a friendly and stimulating activity and we feel much needed - and so will you.

#### **OWEN ENGLISH**

By the sudden death on 22nd December 1997 of Owen English Walberswick has lost another of its engaging and well-liked characters.

Owen was the third son of Robert and Ada English, of a family long respected in Walberswick history, one of four brothers who went off to serve in the 1939/45 war. He enlisted in the Navy at the age of 16½ in 1942 and after initial training joined the escort carrier HMS Queen and served in five Russian convoys escorting merchant ships taking supplies to the Russians at Murmansk. In these he played his part, and when on action stations helped to man the A A Bofors or Oerlikon guns against frequent German air attacks.

Owen finished the war in the British Pacific Fleet in the Far East against Japan and when he returned to Walberswick on demobilisation worked for a time with Blucher English and Leslie Goodwin on building work. After that he turned to gardening and looked after several gardens in the village and developed his own allotment.

We shall all miss the cheerful, burly figure in the sailor's cap, coming into the shop and cracking jokes or walking his dog Bobo. He was always ready for a chat and advice on vegetable growing.

Owen was a man with a very kind heart. He lived with his parents and looked after both in old age, his father until 1970 and his mother Ada until she died aged 98 in 1994.

It was typical of Owen that the morning that he died, although not feeling well, he called on one of the ladies whose garden he looked after to make sure she was all right, as he had done daily for several years.

As we prepare for a second season of car park charges, it may be appropriate to circulate a brief review of progress so far

The dramatic increase in visitor numbers recently has resulted in serious erosion of our car parks, access tracks and greens. During 1996 it was felt that reintroduction of car park charges, last levied in the 1970s, would generate the income needed to maintain these facilities. There might, with luck, be a surplus which could be used for charitable purposes within the village, or to assist in the funding of community projects.

Responsibility for administration of the car park land previously leased to Suffolk County Council - lies with Walberswick CLC. Charity Trusts are not permitted to run businesses, but trustces can be unsalaried directors of separately set-up business organisations. The Charities Commission were very helpful in providing guidelines which have been closely followed. Walberswick Car Parks Ltd thus came into being, with a board of directors consisting of most of the trustees, the Chairman of the Parish Council, and one additional person with proven business management expertise (Mr Gerald Tooley). The chairman of the board of management is Mr Rae Leighton.

Setting-up costs were considerable. Mr Leighton pursued several fund-raising options, and we were able to secure a loan under the SUCCESS scheme. Attendants' huts, tabards, money bags and tickets were acquired, and signage arranged. A salaried manager - Mr David Webb - was appointed, and part-time assistants were recruited. On May 1 we were in business.

As reported at the public meeting in the autumn, the season was a considerable success. The disposable surplus - after keeping back what would be required for general maintenance - still reached five figures. Residents were invited, through Village News, to submit ideas about how this money, covenanted to the WCLC, might be spent. Response was very healthy, and included purchase of a market stall for village events; illumination of the church tower or ruins; a hearing loop system for the church; financial assistance for Southwold and Halesworth Cottage Hospitals; purchase of a community minibus; financial assistance for an existing minibus which serves Walberswick; financial assistance for the Royal British Legion to aid village work; contribution to the Blyth Valley millennium Scheme to promote local arts; a sum to be set aside for existing beneficiaries of the Trust; provision of a skateboarding ramp; wooden play equipment for the Village Green; a track to enable wheelchairs to reach the beach; replacement of the slide; replacement of swings on the Common; sponsorship to have the Walberswick Scroll professionally videoed; enhancement of the area outside the Tuck Shop; provision of allotment stand-pipes; provision of a cycle/footpath around the north side of the village; hire of a minibus on a regular basis to take passengers to Southwold or Halesworth; financial support for internet access; a light to illuminate church pathway; refurbishment of gents' toilet in Village Hall; resurfacing of the entire Village Hall car park; new heating system for the Village Hall; computer and printing equipment for Village News.

A meeting was arranged on January 21 between the Trustees and members of the Parish Council for initial discussion about these suggestions. Not all were deemed viable, while some which cannot be given a go-ahead this year may well be reconsidered in the future. While we remain a popular tourist destination this form of income should be an ongoing situation.

A second meeting, at which some decisions should be reached, has been arranged for February 25. Members of both bodies are concerned the money should be spent carefully and wisely; a report on further progress will appear in the next *Village News*.

#### **JANUARY BIRDS**

Although the continuing mild Winter kept the more northern Duck species away, truly wild White -fronted(43) and Pink-footed(8) Geese could be found amongst the resident feral flocks of Grey Lag(100+) and Canadas(100+) inhabiting the fields below Southwold Golf Course. At the same location 3000+ Golden Plover made a handsome site as they wheeled into roost at high tide. Up the Blyth towards the A12 Avocets(250+) cut a dramatic black and white ribbon, bobbing up and down on grey water.

At sea, Red-throated Eivers peaked at 40+ on the 20th, whilst a scattering of Great Crested Grebes could be found on most days. Along the beach towards Dunwich, the now-residert Little Egret seemed to be surviving the Winter. Snow Bur ting were scarce, but 10 on the 23rd were notable and the Roaming Twite flock stood at 80+ on the 6th. A careful search of Westwood Marshes reed beds would provide both Marsh and Hen Harriers, the latter including a superb adult male. The village Tawny Owls, 2-3 pairs, were quite vociferous during the month.

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

#### WALBERSWICK BIRDSONG WALK

The annual birdsong walk will take place on Saturday May 2nd. Please meet at Hoist Wood car park at 5.30am. Contributions as usual to St Andrew's Church. Flip Bruce-Lockhart has kindly agreed to help with the walk this year.

This will be the 15th birdsong walk. The first was in 1984 as part of the auction of promises to raise money for the church roof and since then modest amounts have been collected annually totalling about £250.

Numbers of resident birds have changed over the years, an increase in sparrow hawks and magpies, a decline in skylarks, pipits, bullfinches, meadow song thrushes, yellowhammers and house sparrows on land, and snipe, redshank and lapwing on the marsh. Some believe the decline in land birds is due to the increases in predators. I do not think so, and believe there are other factors responsible.

Migrant bird numbers and species have remained fairly constant save that avocets have increased and swallows and house martins have declined disastrously. Cetti's warbler appeared for two years reported back at Minsmere.

**ALLOCATION OF 1997 CAR PARK PROFITS - A BRIEF SUMMARY** 

A meeting was held on February 25th between Walberswick Common Lands Charity and members of Walberswick Parish Council to discuss further the proposals considered initially on January 21st. A number of decisions were made, and well over half the proposals received from the village were accepted for funding. Some projects will be fully financed, while others which are subject to grant aid from elsewhere will receive more limited assistance.

Briefly, the projects to receive assistance will be the market stall for village events; the hearing loop for the church; funding aid for the Southwold and Reydon minibus to extend its use for the benefit of Walberswick residents; extra help for Trust beneficiaries; funding for the replacement of the slide on the Green, swings on the Common and for a skateboard ramp; revision of the Tuck Shop frontage; illumination of the church pathway; computer equipment for Village News and the making of a video of the Walberswick Scroll.

All who submitted proposals should by now have been notified about the outcome; if more detailed discussion is needed about the thinking behind the decisions, the Trustees or the Clerk would be happy to be approached.

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## CHURCH MATTERS

#### LETTER FROM JANE WILSON

Writing this letter the day after my Licensing, I have been reflecting on the verse on which Bishop Richard based his address: "Look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others." His comments on that verse were both a challenge and an encouragement to me, as I pray they were to all those who came to the service. The first eleven verses of Philippians 2 are especially appropriate for this season of the year when, during April, we move from Lent into Holy Week, then into Easter and the time of celebration which follows it and which continues, beyond April, to Pentecost. This passage supremely points us to the Lord Jesus Christ, who is of course our perfect example of one who "looked not to his own interests." If he had, would he have walked the way of the Cross, agonised in Gethsemane and cried out "My God my God why have you forsaken me?" However, this looking not to his own interests was far more than an example to us. It was an offering of himself, a giving up of his reputation, his place of honour at the Father's right hand. His humbling of himself "even to death on a Cross," was for you and for me. He died that we might live. He died that we might be set free and he died that we, through faith in him, might be made righteous, be put right with God. So let us, during this most holy season of the year, "look not to our own interests", but "look unto Jesus who for the joy that was set before him endured

the Cross, disregarding its shame and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God," (Hebrews 12:2). These words from Graham Kendrick's hymn sum it up:

"So let us learn how to serve And in our lives enthrone him Each others' needs to prefer For it is Christ we're serving. This is our God, the servant King He calls us all to follow him To bring our lives as a daily offering Of worship to the Servant King." May I wish you all a happy and blessed Easter.

#### WALBERSWICK COMMON LANDS CHARITY - A BRIEF REPORT

A meeting of the Trust was held on February 19th. The main points were:-

\*The Chair: Barbara Priestman was re-elected, but expressed a wish to relinquish the post at the end of the coming year.

\*The Print Room: Some revisions of specification are planned due to inflation in the estimated cost of the rebuild.

\*The new agreement proposed for occupiers of riverside properties has drawn generally favourable comment. but in some cases there will be a need for individual consultation.

\*Spraying of the Cliff Field for elimination of ragwort and removal of sycamore saplings from the Common adjacent to Moorside will be subjects of a meeting in the near future with Steve Clarke of Suffolk Wildlife Trust. The Cliff Field boundary fence will be dealt with as the evenings grow lighter.

\*Limited storage of boats adjacent to Tow's Cabin will be negotiated, restoring an ancient tradition.

\*The fence alongside the Went (on the way to the caravan site) is to be rebuilt in a secure and permanent manner. Traffic to the site is now the only traffic using this track, so the site operator will be asked to contribute to the cost.

\*Adjustments are to be made to the charges for residents' parking on the land adjacent to Ferry Cottage.

\*There was a discussion about the preparation (but no hard surfacing) of the ground to the west of Ferry Road for overspill car parking at peak times. \*1998 Budget figures were published and discussed.

\*Some decisions were agreed about aid for Trust beneficiaries.

The latter end of the period saw small flocks of duck heading North, comprising mainly teal and widgeon. Two goosander were seen on the 9th and six on the 14th. The same day saw a lone bewick swan, also northbound. A small flock of whooper swans flew south over the beach huts on the morning of the 14th of March, their evocative trumpeting calls echoing down from a beautiful vivid blue sky. One could almost see and feel the wildness of their summer arctic tundra homeland.

It was a good period for birds of prey; with a common buzzard on the 23rd and 24th Feb soaring over the village, a Merlin hunting along the sea wall towards Dunwich on the 10th March, whilst the hen harrier and female marsh harrier still graced Westwood marshes.

The flooded meadows below Southwold golf course hosted a fine adult Mediterranean gull on the 24th Feb and over fifty white fronted geese on the 14th March.

This winter has seen extremely good numbers of siskin in the village, evident by their appearance at most garden bird tables. Crossbills are still plentiful with over 50 in the pine trees behind the Dingles, including three singing males, cutting a handsome sight in their fiery red livery.

Starlings are abundant at the moment, with several large flocks of over 6000 birds in the fields surrounding the village. These will be birds from Eastern Europe and Russia gathering together prior to embarking on their return journey - having successfully wintered this side of the North Sea.

#### NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

The last meeting was held on Monday the 2nd of March 1998. The official minutes are displayed on the Council noticeboard at the village hall and in the Church porch.

Complaints had been received regarding the unsightly position of the newly erected sign which indicates the position of the cables under the river Blythe. It is recognised that the sign must be visible from the river, however a request has been sent to the Harbour Master asking if he would be prepared to have the sign moved to a less visually intrusive position.

The Council have made representations to SCC and SCDC, requesting refusal of the planning application made by ARC to convert the sand and gravel pit at Thorington into controlled land filling with household and industrial waste. The main issue that concerned the PC was the possibility of leaching that could affect public health (via household water), and flora and fauna.

The Suffolk County Council (Restriction of Waiting in the Parish of Walberswick) Order 1998, will shortly be published in the local press. A copy of the order and a map showing the roads affected may be seen at Southwold Library and a County Hall in Ipswich.

The Parish Council were unanimously in favour of Mr Neil Murray of Th: Anchorage continuing to be the r representative on the Harbour Use s Association. He can be contacted on 01502 722022 if anyone has any querics.

The next meeting will be held on Monday 6th April at 7.30 in the Village Hall Annex.

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

#### WATER, WATER NOT EVERYWHERE

The first two words are from The Ancient Mariner by Coleridge, the rest are mine. His reference is to voyaging on salt water rather than the stuff out of the tap for drinking - straight or in our pleasant detached world as a dilutant. We recently had "Water Weck" on BBC Radio & TV: perhaps you are a convert already. Water bills metered or unmetered arc not amongst the most welcome morning mail. With a recent bill you may have seen an invitation to subscribe to "Water Aid". Why should you? Population size in the Northern Hemisphere is nearly static, but that in the South is growing at an alarming rate, pushing the residents of planet Earth from 6 billion today to above 9 billion by 2050; of these 5 billion will be living in cities - double the present number of urbanites. The great steps forward in provision have been largely offset by population increase. Even in the North there has been a significant backlog in providing water of acceptable quality. In the underdeveloped world 2 billion have inadequate sanitation and suffer from typhoid, cholera, and other nasties - in terms of the number of people it kills! Dirty water is the world's most serious pollution problem. Would you disagree that basic sanitation, clean water, and clean air are basic constituents of a humane life for human beings?

Water Aid's vision is of a world in which all people have access to safe water and effective sanitation. Work is carried out through partner organisations in developing countries. #### MAINTENANCE OF LOCAL SEA DEFENCES

Articles in the press and on radio have discussed the implications of rising sea levels for coastal villages and land. Although some of the discussion is 'scare-mongering', it is true that the preferred strategy is likely to be a partial retreat, i.e low-lying areas such as Westwood Marsh will not be defended once the repair of the sand bank becomes unviable. Firstly, this will mean that the sea defence wall around the village will become the only protection. Will it be sufficient? Flooding is most likely to occur as a result of storms and surges, not because of a gentle, slow rise in water levels. The Trustees are concerned that weaknesses in the defences may be neglected unless determined pressure is applied at regular intervals, to bodies such as the Environment Agency,the Government, local Members of Parliament and Authorities. If there appears to be a strong likelihood of flooding in certain post code areas, insurance companies could refuse to insure properties or the cost of insurance could be extremely high.

Secondly, if land outside the village is submerged, a valuable source of income will be lost; the reed beds and grazing marshes usually make about £3000 per annum for the village, and the car parks last year made £15.000. Small amounts in the eyes of remote decision makers, no doubt, but quite significant for the people of Walberswick.

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#### Walberswick Birds. April 1st - May 16

Despite April's inclement weather the Spring migrants duly arrived, albeit spasmodically. Chiffchaffs were in good number by the end of March, willow warblers were next to appear a week later, with 10+ singing by April 9th. The first wheatear put in an appearance on the 9th, with numbers building to 27+ by the 28th. By the third week of April, sedge warblers, grasshopper warblers, garden warblers, blackcaps, whitethroats and lesser whitethroats could all be heard singing in and around the village. The first nightingale of the year (Church Lane) could be heard all day and night from the first week in April. The 9th heralded the first cuckoo, swallows, sand and house martins were all quite late with no appreciable numbers until April 14th. Swifts on the other hand were right on time with good numbers by the end of April. That elegant thrush the ring ouzel was much in evidence, with up to three together on the common whilst others frequented gardens in the village. The more scarce birds seen during the period included the following: an immature glaucous gull that frequented the harbour and latterly the Blyth River; a short-eared owl hunting along the Bailey Bridge Road; a fine spoonbill also down the Blyth and a superb drake garganey and a wood sandpiper kept company on the shore pools close to the beach huts. #### WALBERSWICK COMMON LANDS CHARITY

A meeting of the Trustees took place on April 16. Main issues were:-1. Income distribution. Some fairly routine matters were discussed, as well as a meeting with local representatives of the Royal British Legion, at which it became clear that with so many shared aims some degree of cooperation would be useful. It was agreed that some assistance would be given to the RBL to cover small charitable expenses which their funds could not meet. Regular meetings will be arranged between members of both bodies to discuss - without compromising confidentiality - ways in which further co-operation might be beneficial.

A meeting of the WCLC Income Distribution sub-committee was arranged for May 13th.

2. <u>Reed-beds and Grazing Land</u>. A generally satisfactory situation exists despite some earlier pessimism about this year's reed-cutting income. The Trust will, however, have to undertake some dyke clearance on the grazing marshes in the autumn.

3. <u>Property.</u> Work scheduled for The Potters Wheel (painting the roof) and the Print Room (rebuild) will now take place in the autumn.

4. <u>Cliff Field</u>. Fencing of the Cliff Field, and installation of a gate for 'exceptional circumstance' vehicular access have now been completed, and advice sought about ragwort eradication.

5. <u>Suffolk Wildlife Trust</u>. A meeting has taken place between Trustees and SWT to confirm and redefine details of the agreed schedule of Common management work, including the clearance of footpaths.

6. <u>Walberswick Car Parks Ltd.</u> Agreement has been reached for the lease to run for three years.
7. <u>Riverside Properties</u>. Further progress is being made on leasing arrangements, to protect the interests of both the Trust and lessees.
The next full meeting of the Trust is on June 18. Richard Scott

#### LETTER FROM THE TEAM VICAR OF SOUTHWOLD

I have been reminded this month of a prayer of Michael Quoist's from his book "Prayers of Life" (published in English in 1963 by Gill & Son). This prayer has always meant a great deal to me, so I share it with you, whether you have always lived near the sea or, like me, are new to the experience.

Keep me from those angry outbursts that draw attention but leave one uselessly weakened.

Rather, Lord, grant that I may live my days calmly and fully, as the sea slowly covers the whole shore.

Make me humble like the sea, as silently and gently it spreads out, unnoticed. May I wait for my brothers and sisters and match my pace to theirs, that I may move upward with them.

Grant me the triumphant perseverance of the waters.

May each of my retreats turn into an advance.

Give my face the light of clear waters.

Give my soul the whiteness of foam.

Illumine my life that it may sing like the sunbeams on the surface of the sea. But above all. Lord, may I not keep this light for myself, and may all those who come near me return home eager to bathe in your eternal grace." Amen.

Why not find time to go and sit by the sea and pray this prayer? May the God who made the sea bless you all,

with love and good wishes.

#### WALBERSWICK BIRDS MAY 17TH - JUNE 13TH

Turtle dove numbers, unlike some of our recently arrived summer visitors, would appear to be up on previous years, with several pairs in and around the village, their soft purring reminding us of warm summer evenings to come. We only wait upon the spotted flycatchers to complete the summer scene. The year's broods are already much in evidence: with seven mute swan cygnets near the Bailey Bridge; fully fledged stonechats around Lampland; families of bearded tits abroad in the reed beds whilst avocet and ringed plover chicks totter on spindly legs around the shore pools. High above the reed beds that most elegant of falcons, the hobby, may be seen in suitable weather hawking for dragonflies which it expertly devours on the wing. The sea is regaining its interest after a quiet period with fulmars now seen daily and the recent gale conditions bringing several gannets within viewing distance. Passing migrants found along the shore pools, most of which were in their dazzling summer livery included: turnstone(6) on the 19/5; greenshank(4) on the 27/5; grey plover(6) on the 18/5; along with a sprinkling of dunlin, common sandpipers, black-tailed godwits and bar-tailed godwits. Notable birds during the period - a fine spoonbill has taken up residence in the fields west of the Bailey Bridge; also three drake garganey on 28/5; the little egret returned to the Walberswick/Dunwich shore pools after a few weeks' absence; the same locality held a little ringed plover that kept the local ringed plovers company on the 19th.



#### FROM THE TEAM RECTOR

As I sit to write this letter I'm preparing to journey in search of the sun in Tuscany. I trust I'll return having found it! Journeying is an essential feature of life - life itself is a series of journeys. We are constantly making new discoveries, experiencing new joys and learning to cope with new sorrows and setbacks.

The Scriptures contain stories of many different journeys that people made, responding to God's call. The Hebrew Scriptures revolve around the journey of God's people from their slavery in Egypt to the Promised Land. There are the wanderings of Abraham and Joseph, the travels of Elijah and Elisha, the years spent in Exile, to name but a few. In the New Testament the story of Jesus' ministry is of a journey from Nazareth to Jerusalem. St. Paul, St. Peter and their colleagues journeyed to spread the Good News of Jesus.


Our faith has its roots in journeying and the Church is often known as the "Pilgrim Church". Jesus Christ, our Cornerstone, revealed himself as "The Way, the Truth and the Life". He promised to send the Spirit, to lead us into all truth. In each generation the Holy Spirit leads believers into deeper understandings of that truth revealed once for all in Jesus Christ. This truth is not static but dynamic and vibrant. The Spirit speaks to us through the Scriptures, through the Tradition of the Church and through the world in which we live today. The Gospel proclaimed by the Church is not a neat tidy package, preserved as in aspic, it is a living, pulsating reality. We have to wrestle with it, we have to use our God given gifts our intellect, emotions, common sense, appreciation of beauty - to hear what God is saying to us today. This is something the Church wrestles with as a family; the Faith is not the possession of any individual it is a shared faith.

Our understanding of the Faith, therefore, will often have many ragged edges. There is always room for further questioning, further exploration, further journeying, with the Spirit of God leading us. Some people find this uncomfortable, preferring simply to receive from on high what they must believe. God, and therefore the Christian Faith, is too wonderful and exciting for this ever to be the case. It does require a sense of boldness, it does require the willingness to take risks and even to get it wrong at times, but these are essential in any living relationship. Have a very happy August, wherever you may find yourself journeying and may your journeying in the Faith of Jesus Christ lead you to an ever deeper experience of his wonderful love for you.

WALBERSWICK BIRDS, JUNE, 14th - JULY 14th

Westwood marsh has been a busy place, with at least two juvenile marsh harriers on the wing by the 6/7, 2 bitterns were in the air together on the 7/7 and the hobbies have been very conspicuous with their dragonfly hunting swoops and dives over the reed beds. Several parties of newly fledged bearded tits would indicate a successful season for them. Throughout the period summering eider ducks have been offshore, sometimes coming on to the beach to preen. A fine spoonbill (Blyth river bird?) took up residence on the beach pools opposite the Dingles for the first few days of July.

This is the period when migration is at its lowest ebb, but there is already a trickle of returning southbound waders. With sea-watchers, producing curlew and dunlin moving in ones and twos on most dates and whimbrel joining in from the 9/7; whilst the beach pools provided juvenile common sandpipers on the 7/7 & 13/7; in contrast a hobby flew north on the 24/6.

Undoubtedly the most notable bird of the period was a magnificent red kite that cruised south over the village on the morning of the 10/7. Moving on to Westwood marsh it performed a couple of lazy low-level circuits before latching on to a rising thermal over the Dingles, whereafter ascending to approximately 1,000 metres it peeled off to continue its southerly journey. Equally exciting to watch were two spoonbills that flew north also over the village on the 15/6, their gleaming bright white plumage standing out like beacons against a huge threatening thunder cloud that was about to decant itself on Walberswick. An adult Mediteranean gull visited the pools behind the beach huts on the 9/7, whilst at sea a franx shearwater flew south on the morning of the 14/7.

If you are visiting Walberswick and would like to send us your thoughts on the area, these would also be welcome. We can


always make sure you get a copy if your name is in print.

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PROPOSED CIVILIAN AIRPORT - RENDLESHAM (RAF BENTWATERS)

Considerable interest, and not a little alarm, has been expressed to me recently over the proposed use of part of the former Bentwaters air base as a regional airport. I thought that it might be useful through the columns of the Village News to explain the procedure which Suffolk Coastal District Council, the planning authority, is likely to employ to determine the planning application.

As background, I have to say that the District Council has been grappling since 1993 with the complex issue of how this area should develop when the American Air Force withdrew from the base. The base is effectively in two parts: to the North of the A1152 is a residential area of some 680 existing dwellings of relatively high density, the greater part of them already occupied, together with a

range of other buildings used by the USAF as part of the domestic infrastructure and now in need of refurbishment to provide amenities and facilities for the folk currently living there. To the South of the A1152 is the redundant airfield with an extensive network of redundant runway, taxiways, hardstandings and a wide range of buildings and structures.

After a number of false starts by different developers since 1993, the latest proposals are for the creation of a residential community with new housing and community facilities such as shops, a school, a pub and places of worship to the North of the A1152 and a commercial area consisting of a business enterprise park, a civil regional airport, a long term secure storage area and a leisure and nature conservation area to the South of the A1152.

The current developers have recently submitted a planning application and Suffolk Coastal District Council have asked local communities for their comments. Local concern has been raised over the level of aviation activity which might ensue in this environmentally sensitive area and in particular the impact of noise, possible pollution and traffic. Many people are adamantly against any aviation activities, while others feel that a small business airport, with adequate controls and restrictions, may be acceptable and beneficial to the local economy. Later this Autumn the Development Control Sub-Committee will deliberate and pass its recommendation to the Environment Committee, on which I sit, for its determination. Many conflicting factors will have to be considered, including whether the decision should be passed out of local hands, to Central Government for the Secretary of State for Transport, the Environment and the Regions to decide. Walberswick is over 16 miles from Bentwaters and I am determined to consider the matter rationally and carefully; nevertheless I know that people have their concerns and I would welcome any comments that people might have.

Thank you for a fantastic response to our request for copy. We had so much that some things couldn't be used this time. They are kept on reserve though, ready for later issues. Eds.

#### LETTER FROM THE TEAM VICAR

"Review of Ministry" is the title of the recent report which looks at how people are trained in our Diocese for different forms of accredited ministry. I thought it would be good to outline some of the theological principles on which the report is based, because this is the theology from which I begin, and from this base the training in our Deanery will evolve.

The minutes of the meeting which discussed the report describe it as "not new and not radical, but profoundly true to the traditional vocation of the Church of England". We are all called to be salt, light, and yeast in the world, and we are called to understand deeply and creatively the difference between going to church and being the church. We are called to grasp and embrace change into which the Holy Spirit is leading us, from being a clericalised church to returning to be a baptismal community. We are called not so much to support an institution as to risk being disciples. At the heart of this sense of vocation is an understanding of baptism, in that it is baptism in Christ which makes people ministers. Ministry belongs to the whole community of believers who have a corporate responsibility to minister. This responsibility is given to us at baptism.

This call to minister may seem daunting, but we are never in it alone: we are part of a worshipping community in which we should be encouraged and nurtured. This is the reason why the post responsible for training in the Deanery was set up, and indeed one of the factors that attracted me to the Sole Bay Team and the Halesworth Deanery. I am hoping that it will soon be possible to set up a training programme that will encourage and nurture us all in our calling as baptised Christians.





#### **NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL**

The last meeting was held on Monday 3<sup>rd</sup> August. The official minutes of meetings are displayed on the council notice board at the Village Hall and in the church porch.

Planning permission had been granted by SCDC for the erection of a timber external staircase at Lima Cottage.

The Parish Council agreed to donate  $\pounds 100.00$  to Suffolk Acre to help them in their quest to find alternative accommodation to establish a Rural Communities Research Centre.

Concern was expressed about vandalism to beach huts and unauthorised barbecues being held on the beach. It was suggested that one way of resolving the problem might be to install a gate and lock the Cliff Field car park over night. This proposal would be put forward for discussion to the Trustees and Car Parks Committee. The Environment Agency had replied to the concerns regarding sea defences. They stated that maintenance to flood walls and defence banks was ongoing and that the shingle bank was reprofiled as material was available and where there was a flood defence need. The Environment Agency had also informed the council that they were producing flood defence strategies for the Deben, Alde-Ore and Blyth Estuaries and were requesting information, views and comments on any changes noted. Mr Kett and Mr Webb agreed to produce maps and photographs showing areas of flooding and changes in the Blyth Estuary.

Mr Kett informed the Council that a seat donated to the village by Miss Bally had been renovated and positioned by the Cattle Arch.

The next meeting will be held on Monday 7<sup>th</sup> September at 7.30pm in the annexe of the Village Hall.



#### LETTER FROM THE TEAM VICAR

The Prayer of St. Francis whose feast day is October 4th, is well known and well loved. It contains the lines

Lord grant that I may never seek so much to be consoled as to console to be understood as to understand, to be loved as to love with all my soul. I always find those words a challenge, but we are called as the Church to care for

one another. St. Paul says in Galatians 6.v2

Bear one another's burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ.

The Bible commentator the Rev. Dr. John Stott says of this verse:-

'Notice the assumption which lies behind this command, namely that we all have burdens and that God does not mean us to carry them alone. Some people try to. They think it is a sign of fortitude not to bother other people with their burdens. Such fortitutude is certainly brave. But it is more stoical than Christian.' (The Bible speaks Today). Dr. Stott goes on to say that while we also rely on God as the divine burden bearer ( 'Cast your burden on the Lord and he will sustain you' - Psalm 55.22), one of the ways God bears these burdens of ours - worries, temptations, doubts, sorrow, ill health - is through human friendship. Throughout the Sole Bay Team there are many who are good at sharing the burdens of others, just as there are many with heavy burdens to bear. I want to develop that sort of care, burden bearing and sharing in the Sole Bay Team not just for Church members but for the Communities in which we live and worship. I am therefore looking for those who could be recognized in their Churches as Team Visitors (they are probably doing it already) and who would receive some training. This would enable them to visit the bereaved, the sick, lonely and housebound as well as those with other cares, with loving sensitivity and an ability to listen. So I invite anyone with a heart for caring for others (or if you know of someone who would be suitable) to contact me. I have already asked the Team's Churchwardens to think of those they know.

In the meantime may we all be challenged to be 'Channels of God's Peace'. With all good wishes



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#### **CHURCH LIGHTING**

I read in the Village News of the proposal to construct a wrought iron archway over the church gate to support a light to illuminate the pathway. Is this idea illconceived and inappropriate? Some may see it as visually intrusive and feel that it will destroy the view of the ancient church and towering ruins. It could also be said that it may be dangerous - dazzling drivers, cyclists and pedestrians alike. The light could also prove a target for vandals and be a source of 'light pollution'.

Would low level path lighting provide illumination to the church entrance without most of the drawbacks outlined above - and at less cost? David Webb

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#### CHURCH BUILDING

At long last we are about to start work on the Tower parapet; the pointing around the top courses and the pinnacles needs renewing; even so, we are only authorised to erect the scaffold at this stage, and Heritage will need to agree the remedial work thereafter. We also have to spray the tower walls and some of the walls in the ruins to kill off weed infestation which, if allowed to grow, will eventually damage the flints. Whilst the scaffold is in position, we will be removing some of the louvres to the bell chamber of the tower in order to gain access to that chamber, and clear out the bird guano which is inches deep and will become a health hazard; repairs to the louvres is necessary in places, and the inside surfaces will then be covered in stainless steel expanded metal, to stop any future fouling by birds. Some windows in the tower will also be replaced, and I hope parents will restrain their children firing conkers and other missiles at the glass in the future, since it is very expensive to repair. I am awaiting final authority from the diocese to erect the outside light to the church. Both of these improvements, you will recall, were kindly donated from the car park venture.

#### **NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL**

Suffolk County Council had reported that a Public Enquiry had been arranged for Wednesday 4<sup>th</sup> November at Walberswick Village Hall from 10:00 am to 5:00 pm to consider Suffolk County Council (Blyth District definitive map and statement) Parish of Walberswick - RUPPS 21, 28, 29 & 50) Reclassification Order 1995. SCC is recommending that for RUPP 50 (Short Lane) no Traffic Regulation Order be made and that the route is monitored over a period of eighteen months to assess the extent of vehicular use and to estimate the effect of usage on the surface. SCC is recommending that RUPPS 28 & 29 (Deadman's Covert) are reclassified as Bridleways and that the first section of RUPP 21 (Stocks Lane to Lampland Marshes) is reclassified as a bridleway and that the second section (Lampland Marshes to Point Marsh ) is reclassified as a footpath. SCC Environment and Transport Department had also requested consultation from the Parish Council to consider further parking restrictions, including waiting restrictions along The Street out of the village to allow safer parking for churchgoers and also in Manor Close to avoid accesses being blocked by parked vehicles. The Council had no objections to the restrictions in Manor Close but were concerned about the time limit imposed outside the Church. The Clerk would make further investigations. The Council were also in favour of restricted waiting in the areas of the Tuck Shop and Potter's Wheel Restaurant. Next meeting 5 October Village Hall Annexe 7.30pm.. Vivien Hunt



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#### YOUR COMMON NEEDS YOU!

The volunteer working parties are essential to the continuing conservation of the Suffolk Sandlings (of which Walberswick Common is a part) comprising a narrow belt of glacial sands and gravels extending from Lowestoft to Ipswich. This heathland evolved through centuries of intensive grazing on impoverished dry acid soils cleared of tree cover by man. When old heather plants die they are normally replaced by vigorous young heather regrowth - a cycle which takes many years. Heather becomes vulnerable to infestation before it can regenerate where there is free birch, pine, bracken and high gorse. It is critical to control the spread of these plants.

Heathland provides a wide range of wildlife habitats, and people value the typical heathland view of purple heather and yellow gorse. We are fortunate in Walberswick in that the Common is held in trust by the Common Lands Charity who pass on their grant from the Countryside Stewardship Scheme to the Suffolk Wildlife Trust to provide the management of the Common under the umbrella of the Sandlings Group.

The Heritage Lottery Fund Council has awarded a grant of up to  $\pounds 530,000$  to be spent on the Sandling heaths over the next five years. To release this money Suffolk Wildlife has to find matched funds, which can be in the form of working hours from charities and volunteers. We need more volunteers to work for two hours on a Thursday afternoon, starting on 12th November. Tools will be provided. Meet at Church Lane Car Park at 2.15, or phone me (723910) for more information.

#### **ROYAL BRITISH LEGION**

This year's Walberswick & Blythburgh Royal British Legion Summer Outing was something completely different. Unexplored military/naval installations in our area were hard to find, but there remained the Secret Bunker, near Harwich. Not a nick-name of a pub, but no-longer-secret HQ of East Anglia's anti-nuclear defence.

Cheerful weather, fortunately, and a sense of drama dawned soon after Ipswich as we turned off the A12 towards the sea and descended through miles of increasingly narrow lanes. Eventually a small unofficial-looking notice on our right at the roadside announced 'Secret Bunker'. Soon a roomy car park changed the ambience and we climbed out and walked into the past. The place was clearly left as last used - an unimportant looking small brick structure with a door marked 'Way In'. A narrow stone stairway plunged deep. We peered into dimly lit rooms - iron bedsteads - ranks of teleprinters 'voice-over' explaining it all - and eventually a comfortable little cinema for a film starting with a lingering shot of the Hiroshima bomb in full display. Its effect on millions of Japanese in seconds flat was stated as an opener. Then we saw the Operations Room in action - a large round table with the duty officers at work listening, consulting, fingers ready on appropriate buttons - all in business suits, collar and tie...noise of aircraft...cool statistician commentators....How did it end? My mind shut down. We scattered, deeply companionably, to the various pubs of Parkeston Quay. I realised only afterwards that in the bunker we had neither seen nor heard a live human being except each other - until we reached the welcome coffee counter at the very end. The illusion was marvellously sustained, and very, very uncomfortable. The only subsequent comment I heard from a fellow-traveller was: 'They wouldn't have had a chance, would they?' #### FROM THE TEAM RECTOR

November is that month in the Christian year when our thoughts turn especially to the dead. We begin the month with the great feast of All Saints. On this day we give thanks for the witness of the heroes of our faith down the ages and for the communion we have with them in the Church Triumphant. The Saints provide us with inspiration as we seek to live the Christian life, helping us realise that many of the problems we face today have been common to believers in every generation. As we prepare to enter the new Christian year on Advent Sunday - 29th November - perhaps we could make it a resolution to read one of the many books available today about one of these great figures or, even better, something that they themselves have written. We can only go forward in faith if we are firmly rooted in the past (but not stuck there!).

The 2<sup>nd</sup> November is All Souls Day, when we remember our own departed loved ones. There will be a Memorial and Thanksgiving Service at 7:30 p.m. in the Church of St. Peter and St. Paul, Wangford. This is intended primarily for those who have lost loved ones recently but anyone who wishes to remember someone who has departed this life is warmly invited to attend. Death is the one thing that is certain for each one of us and an important part of being a Christian is living our lives in preparation for the day when we will be called through that gateway. We should have no fear of death and it is important that this confidence should be expressed in Christian funeral services. A Christian funeral should also be a time to give thanks to God for the life of the deceased and to pray for those who mourn. It is also the occasion to say a temporary "farewell", though in no way denying the reality of death and the separation it does involve. We remember especially those who sacrificed their lives in the name of truth and justice and to free the world from oppression and injustice. One essential element of honouring these comrades, in truth and deed as well as in words, must be for each one of us to commit ready for her first recital. Please give her ourselves to work for justice and peace in God's world.

The following Sunday we are asked to remember all those who have died as a result of road traffic accidents and those who are still having to come to terms with the DEANERY TRAINING EVENTS aftermath of such tragedies.





#### ETHIOPIAN BAPTISM ON THE BEACH

Saturday evening, 31st October, an Irish woman phoned from London to discuss a bonfire and a booking for the village hall. "We are going to bring a coachload of Ethiopian street children over for the day. How far is it to the beach?" Sunday lunchtime and the phone rings again, "I'm here at the village hall." "I'll be with you in 10 minutes" At the village hall I meet two young women and an 8 month old baby, show them the crocks, get out some tables, then off to the beach and the bonfire site. "Marvellous!" They said. After about 15 minutes when they had collected themselves, they asked "have you any dinner plates, cutlery and various bits of kitchen equipment?" So, home to find Pat and get her into Anneka Rice mode, to sort out some bits and pieces. These duly acquired we both went back to the village hall where a party was beginning to take shape. We met up with Pam and Keith Webb and arranged to return later in the afternoon. 4.30, the coach arrived and spilled its bewildered cargo onto the car park. The New York priest who was going to perform the baptism had been collected from Norwich. The Ethiopian contingent, dressed in national costume, gathered their ceremonial blankets about them and followed the mother, baby, priest and godparents in the twilight to the beach. All of them were carrying white balloons and lighted candles in jars. We followed with the sounds of Ethiopian music ringing in our ears. To the amazement of people on the beach, who had never seen such goings on, we formed a circle just above the tideline with our candles in the sand in front of us and our balloons gently bobbing on that lazy wind that goes through you rather than round you. The nearly full moon was glowing gently, sending a broad shaft of moonlight over the quiet sea towards the small knot of people gathered on the beach. Songs were sung, prayers said and the baby was baptised Isaac Luke Bryan. He was baptised with sea water, to the sound of Ethiopian singing. Then all the balloons were released together and disappeared from view into the night sky. Wending our way back to the village hall, our visitors began to find their feet and enjoy themselves. As the meal was being prepared they really got going, singing, chanting, yodelling, dancing and hip-swaying, all to the beat of drums, fit enough to blow out the walls!

These twenty-five or so youngsters from 14-20 had been street children in Addis Ababa; they had been sponsored by The Glennie Trust, which is supported with aid from our government. The Irish lady had been with this group for 3 years. They have been invited to London and had appeared on Blue Peter on Monday 26th October. They were due to appear as guests at the Albert Hall on Monday 2nd November at a youth dance festival, but tonight they were celebrating! After the meal, christening cake and champagne, we all trooped over to the allotments for the bonfire, where we enjoyed more dancing amid the smoke and the flames.

#### THE COMMON LANDS CHARITY

Riverside leases in revised form have proved satisfactory to foreshore lessees, but some queries remain from occupiers of riverside properties. It was decided that sale of leases should be avoided if possible, but "premium payment with peppercorn rent" might be negotiated if requested. The Cliff Field/campsite boundary will be marked more permanently with concrete slabs, as previous attempts with wooden stakes have proved impermanent.

An ESA (environmentally sensitive area) grant has been applied for in respect of Town Marshes. The marshes need dyke clearance, re-fencing and a new gate. The 40% grant will greatly facilitate this work. The Parish Council's suggestion for a lockable gate at the entrance to Cliff Field was considered very carefully. While in principle desirable, some serious objections would need to be resolved first. Cliff Field ragwort clearance by the Suffolk Wildlife Trust has not been successful, and payment is being withheld until the job has been completed. Footpath clearance on the common has been neglected by the Suffolk Wildlife Trust and a complaint is being lodged with a higher authority than the unit responsible for the work. The trees adjacent to The Potter's Wheel are to be pruned for safety reasons. Some help from the Trust could be forthcoming if the grant applied for by the Parish Council for swings on the common does not materialise. **Richard Scott** 

#### CHARLES RIDDELL 1910-1998

Charlie was born in the City of London in 1910 and deeply proud of his cockney origins. He loved London; the city, its history, architecture and culture. He especially loved the theatre, music and his abundant passion was football - Spurs in particular. He felt one of his greatest achievements was to play football for The London Schoolboys' Football Team. Charlie reluctantly had to leave school at 14 to become apprenticed as a shopfitter. He was fiercely proud of his working class origins and became a Trade Union official for The Amalgamated Society of Woodworkers and Union of Construction and Allied Trades. His roots were embedded in socialist philosophy; he held deep beliefs in personal freedom. After moving to Walberswick in 1978, he was invited to become Secretary to the Wildfowlers (a position which was extraordinary as he would never dream of killing anything) and was known to address the meeting as comrades! He loved animals, and in London would feed stray cats on building sites and always had carrots and sugar for the rag-and-bone man's horse. He was a committed family man, who loved to be at home in front of the fire, where he avidly followed the news. Charlie offered warm and generous hospitality to all friends and visitors and will be sadly missed by many in the village.

#### **NEWS FROM MINSMERE**

October was one of the best month's birdwatching recorded on the reserve thanks to strong north-easterly winds during the first two weeks, ideal for bringing migrants across from Europe. Things started with an isabelline wheatear on the 4th -a new bird for the reserve-and a species whose nearest breeding location is in Greece and north-west Turkey! Literally hundreds of winter thrushes arrived on the 6th, together with 37 ring ouzels, the latter increasing to 85 + on the 7th with birds lingering to 11th. The 6th also produced 5 merlins, hoopoe, great grey shrike (2 were present on the 9th) and rough legged buzzard. Other supporting cast birds included firecrest on the 4th and 7th; Lapland bunting to the 9th; up to 10 each of shorelark and snow bunting; the first hen harrier. Bewick swan and goldeneye of the winter; twite on the 9th (2) and 26th (3); red-necked grebe on the 16th; black redstart on the 16th and 17th; and late wood and curlew sandpipers! The month ended with spectacular early morning movements of woodpigeons, 9,240 on 29th and 10,155 on 30th. Brian Payne

The company played its part in the village visitor management scheme now in place and few problems in this respect occurred. The level of complaints has effectively been non-existent compared to last year. Operations ran extremely smoothly and although the weather throughout the summer was at best indifferent, the number using the car parks was only down by a thousand or so on last year. Many more motorists availed themselves of season tickets. Over the season the Company was able to provide employment to over 20 local people on full-and part-time bases and half of that number qualified for bonuses. Once again we believe our attendants have performed with impeccable courtesy and have shown cheerfulness and helpfulness in the most extreme weather conditions. Mr Alvin Hunt has been a very resourceful Manager and has been re-engaged for next season.

Mr Tony Khon is again being appointed as the Company auditor and the reports on the accounts will be available at the close of our financial year in early January. Pre-audit figures indicate that a net profit in the order of £12, 800 has been realised after payment of rent of £3, 500 to Walberswick Common Lands Charity, the owner of the car parks' land; and the Directors agreed that £1, 000 should be paid in bonuses to staff.

The extremely wet weather has seriously damaged areas of the car parks and it is obvious that considerable maintenance work will have to be carried out over the next few months. Consultation is in hand but it is unclear at this stage exactly what the cost will be; however, the Directors anticipate that a sum in the order of £8,000-£9,000 will be available to covenant to the Walberswick Common Lands Charity.
