A second open meeting to discuss ways of celebrating the millennium by all the local churches in the Sole Bay area was held on 4<sup>th</sup> November. Three aims emerged as the result of both meetings.

The first aim is to celebrate the 2000<sup>th</sup> birthday of our Lord Jesus Christ, 2000 years of Christian history, and to make Christ known to those who do not know about him. The second is to leave some lasting memorial for the local community, and third to support a third world project. This aim echoes the 'Churches Together' theme of a new start for the world's poor.

It was also recognised that there were three strands to be woven together in order to present a united Christian whole: projects and events from individual churches; from Southwold and District Ecumenical Group; and from the Sole Bay Team Ministry. We want to blend these strands together to demonstrate our unity and diversity, to work together to make Christ known in our neighbourhood.

On 31<sup>st</sup> December, we will join with the nation in the lighting of a candle in every home, and in the pause for prayer and reflection just before midnight. We hope all the church bells will be rung at midday on 1<sup>st</sup> January. Then we hope there will be an Ecumenical Service and Procession on Sunday 2<sup>nd</sup> January, in Southwold. At Pentecost, we suggest a United Christian Procession around the whole of the Sole Bay area with short services at various points along the route.

As mentioned in November's magazines, each church is invited to contribute to a Pageant of 2000 years of Christian history, focussing on an event in its church's life. It is hoped the proceeds from this would go to support a project to provide goats for poor villagers in Uganda; it is under the management of Farm Africa. Other events could also contribute to this worthy cause.

Other suggestions were to have a millennium mug, a millennium magazine with contributions and information from all churches in the area. An illuminated Cross on the top of every church, to be lit throughout the year and thereafter on special occasions was another idea.

We would like events and activities to be organised for children, possibly an art competition, and we hope to have a major youth event in the summer.

Volunteers are needed to make these ideas happen. More ideas are needed. Do ring Jane Wilson on 01502 722397 if you would like to be involved.

#### SUFFOLK MEMORIES

The launch of 'Suffolk Memories' packed Walberswick village hall on December 8th. Free coffee and mince pies, made and served by the British Legion members and friends, enhanced the upbeat atmosphere. Many relatives of war dead mentioned and often pictured in the book strove to attend. Stacks of this handsome book awaited them - advance subscriptions enabling the compilers to proceed clear of debt.

Pick up this book, with its gentle title and richly populated, colourful front cover. You will probably start by looking up names you know, quickly get hooked by one story or another and switch to numbers games - how many war fronts, oceans, countries? You are then plunged suddenly into personal dramas, ships, planes, hospital, WRVS and NAAFI front-line episodes. The stories far outnumber the 82 Walberswick and Blythburgh survivors interviewed. Some short, some long, all are brilliantly chosen and edited. A book was never intended, when at the 1990 Royal British Legion AGM in Walberswick every member present was given a small form on which (for branch records) to record the basic details of their war service, mainly to spare members the problems inaccuracies could cause. My husband, Geoff, already house-bound by a stroke suffered some years earlier responded immediately. Next morning he went straight to his desk and started writing, quickly filling 75 pages of foolscap. I found it wonderful stuff and suggested he carry on and tell all from RNC Dartmouth schooldays in the 20's to the pre-D-Day enemy beaches in 1944. That produced Geoff's Opus which raised some money for the Branch. Geoff would have loved David and Arthur's brilliantly conceived and executed record of so many other people's WWII. Major General J. B. Dye CBE MC DL, patron of the Walberswick and Blythburgh Branch of the Royal British Legion, writes in his preface "The two villages comprise some 400 families, a number which has not changed much. In the mere course of conversation over the years, with the reticence of our generation, I had little idea of their experiences during the Second World War. Consequently I have been amazed at the world-wide involvement of the members of these two small communities. Their stories cover every theatre of war, some battles almost forgotten, and remind us also of the conditions at home....the bravery and suffering of refugees and those under enemy occupation, the rigours and privations of war." Get it while you can! It will sell fast.

#### MILLENNIUM PROBLEMS

Many of you may be aware of the so-called "Millennium Bug" which will/may affect computers and computer-controlled equipment. Reports of its effects vary from world-wide chaos to none whatsoever. Somewhere in between lies the truth.

Before I can do so however I must identify with some urgency your areas of concern and obtain details of areas/groups/ inhabitants that may, particularly, be at risk.

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#### WALBERSWICK LOCAL HISTORY GROUP

#### WALBERSWICK COMMON LANDS CHARITY REPORT

#### Car Park Profits

A meeting has been arranged with representatives of the Parish Council during February to discuss suggestions for the allocation of 1998 car park profits. (Late entries, with cost breakdown, to Jayne Tibbles at Lima cottage ASAP please).

#### Common Management

Problems reported recently, with Suffolk Wildlife Trust's management of the Common were addressed and discussed. There is reason to hope that the situation has been resolved, but progress will be carefully monitored.

#### Problem with Shifting Sand

Environment Agency Representatives met members of the Trust and Parish Council following expressions of concern about shifting sands adjacent to East Point. Wire baskets filled with stone could be placed strategically but anything more fixed is considered unwise. The shingle movement will be kept under close observation. The EA also undertook to be more active in conveying high tide warnings.

#### New Print Room

Progress on the new Print Room was reviewed; it is satisfactory and details of its wheelchair access were discussed.

#### Riverside Leases

Leases for riverside properties were again discussed. The details are quite complicated, but a satisfactory solution now seems imminent.

#### Swings to Be Moved

The Trustees agreed to the Council's request to move the swings on the Common from their present location to a new position adjacent to the playing field.



#### LETTER FROM THE TEAM RECTOR

No sooner does it seem that Christmas is behind us than we find ourselves preparing for Lent. This season leads up to the greatest of all Christian celebrations, the commemoration of the death and resurrection of Jesus. A few weeks ago we were celebrating his birth in Bethlehem; it is his death and resurrection which puts Christmas in its truly Christian perspective. "God so loved the world that he gave His only Son"; he gave him to us born of Mary and he freely gave himself to us and for us on the Tree of Calvary. Lent is often thought of as a miserable time, but this should not be its dominant motif at all. During these few weeks we are preparing to celebrate the greatest expression of love the world has ever known; hardly something to be miserable about! These days enable us to look at our lives and undertake a kind of spiritual audit. Many of the questions we can ask ourselves apply to people who are not Christian believers as well as to those of us who are. Fasting and self-denial are partly about asking ourselves, "Do I control my body or does my body control me?" The same question seems to be asked by the current series of programmes on BBC "Fighting Fat, Fighting Fit". There is another spiritual side. Jesus saw fasting as an important adjunct to prayer. This shows that prayer is not just something affecting our minds, it affects our whole selves; mind, body and spirit. Self-denial also gives us an opportunity to save some money and we need to decide what to do with this. A typical Lenten resolution would be to ensure that this money was used for some charitable purpose. Lent is also a time for us to ask ourselves about the priorities in our lives. "What is most important to me?" For a Christian, our relationship with God should be at the top of our list. What do we do to nurture and develop this relationship? What state is our prayer life in? Do we truly avail ourselves of the means of grace God offers us? Do we spend time studying the Scriptures, reading about and discussing our faith and beliefs? Study has always been an essential element of keeping a good Lent. In the Halesworth Deanery we are beginning a course of study in the Christian Faith. This course will be entitled Exploring Our Faith. It will be a course in three parts. The first, (Experiencing Faith) will be held on five consecutive Thursdays, beginning 25th February at 7:30 pm at Bramfield Primary School. For further details of these see the notice in the Church. Have a good Lent! Why not begin by joining us at 10:00 on 17th February in St Andrew's Church for Ash Wednesday Eucharist and the Imposition of Ashes?

#### WALBERSWICK WI

At our meeting this month, on 10th February, we have a welcome return visit from Paul Briscoe completing his story of a childhood in Germany in the '30s. This time he will be telling us his experiences on returning to England after the war. Those members who heard him speak before will vouch for a fascinating tale. Mrs Eve King's talk on Tudor Miniatures at our January meeting was most enjoyable. She enriched her talk with slides of enlarged photographs taken at the V and A of exquisite miniatures painted by Holbein, Hilliard and Isaac Oliver some five hundred years ago. Mrs King was proud of the fact that she had been given many of her photographs by Anthony Blunt - before he turned into the infamous spy! We particularly loved the ones of two sisters aged three and four painted in 1590. We also saw what beautifully painted enamelling was used for the back of these miniatures. In answer to a member's question we were informed that miniatures were very expensive, and at least ten times the cost of an ordinary painting.

We were pleased to learn that from the proceeds of the Bridge Drive last year, four tables and cloths had been donated to the Village Hall for general use.

Always impeccably dressed, I remember collecting him at 4am in the mini-bus we had hired to go to Heathrow; he was already wearing his Panama which he wore throughout the journey and into the jungles of India. He could be a stern disciplinarian and liked authority to be respected. At an Edwardian WATS evening, there was an unseemly event when a suffragette burst in demanding "Votes for Women". Whatever the rights and wrongs of the case, this was the sort of intrusion that Dudley could not stand, and he proclaimed his view forcefully. Donning the policeman's helmet which he happened to have handy, he marched the intruding lady off for a quick arrest. Beneath a gentle exterior there was a "no nonsense" inner core. Perhaps his greatest role was as Count Alfonso in Imbroglio Italiano. Odd, you may think, that such an English person could excel as an Italian, but he was, after all, playing the part of a Count, and the setting was Ischia. Dudley liked and enjoyed, the fine things in life and he shared his enjoyment of them generously with his friends at his home, with Bubbles ever at his side. This loveable man was a loyal and supportive colleague, meticulous and willing in all that he did; he will be enormously missed by all those who had the good fortune to know him. We send our deepest condolences to Bubbles and her devoted family.

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#### NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

The official minutes of meetings are displayed on the council notice board at the village hall and in the church porch.

Planning permission had been granted by SCDC for the following applications subject to the developments being carried out according to the conditions set out by SCDC: a) The Anchorage, The Lea - Erection of single storey extension. b) Dunelm (formerly Densyl) - Insertion of lantern roof to provide first floor study, infilling of covered way to provide utility, pitched roof over garage and single storey front extension. c) Merrydown, Stocks Lane - Construction of new pitched roofs over existing flat roofs, erection of front and rear extensions, side entrance and carport.

The Clerk had written to the Highways Department expressing concern about the state of the B1387 in winter conditions. There had been at least 5 accidents on Friday 27<sup>th</sup> November and one of these included a school bus. The Parish Council requested that SCC should review their arrangements for salting the roads before a serious incident occurred. Subsequently, a reply has been received from SCC stating that they were unable to make the B1387 a 'Priority 1 Route' as it carries a winter load of less than 2,000 vehicles per day, which is the required minimum for precautionary salting. The Council, therefore, has asked SCC if it would place salt storage units at the two main problem bends.

It was unanimously resolved by the council that a precept of £6000.00 should be requested for the year 1999/2000.

A meeting had taken place with Mr Stan Jeavons from the Environment Agency and Mr Peter Marjoram, Flood Defence Engineer for Suffolk to discuss the protection of the banks of the Dunwich River from further erosion which is threatening the car park and access bridge.

Mr Kett reported that there were 3 full allotments or 7 half allotments available for hire. (Please contact the Clerk in the first instance Tel: 723142). Two requests have already been received.

A donation of £100.00 was given to the Parochial Church Council to help with the upkeep of the churchyard.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday, 8<sup>th</sup> February at 7.30pm in the annexe of the Village Hall.

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#### PARISH COUNCIL ELECTION

Parish Council Elections take place on 6th May and all councillors are due for re-election. Parish Council meetings take place once a month and the matters dealt with include: planning, accounts, correspondence, problems experienced in the village etc. Very occasionally there are meetings with other bodies to attend for which travelling expenses are paid. If you feel you would like to become involved in making decisions on issues which affect the parish, then become a candidate in the Parish elections. Nomination papers, available from mid March, can be obtained from either the District Council or the Parish Clerk (Tel:723142). They must be returned to the District Council before 8th April. District Council elections also take place on 6th May and European elections on 10th June. If you are unable to get to the polling station, postal or proxy voting is available. Appropriate forms can also be obtained from the District Council.

#### PLANNED IMPROVEMENTS AT THE TUCK SHOP

Early in 1998 we were visited by an Environmental Health Officer who insisted on some immediate improvements which were duly implemented. He left giving us 12 months to formulate a comprehensive plan of action to bring the shop up to current standards. We have now completed this and are to receive a grant for about 40% of the cost in view of the extensive improvements needed. We had already intended to update some of the shelving and freezers, so we are to incorporate this work into the improvement. Listed below are brief details of the work to take place:

**Electrical wiring -** Much of our wiring does not meet today's safety standards. The wiring needs re-routing and some form of safety circuit breaker in order to protect customers and staff.

**Meat slicer** - Our meat slicer did not meet environmental health requirements and must be replaced. We currently have an approved slicer on loan, pending the grant.

Weighing scales - New legislation requires that we change to metric scales before the end of this year.

Air conditioning - This will allow us to keep the doors closed and external cooling fans off. This will cut down on the amount of dust and dirt that might fall on the fresh food and stock. It will also reduce the number of insects that might enter the shop, as well as reducing the build up of heat and so stopping the chocolate from melting. It will also dramatically improve the fresh fruit and vegetables, which can deteriorate within an hour in the summer. The dangers associated with our current mobile heaters which are used in the winter will be removed.

**Side windows** - These are of the old slatted design, which are impossible to shut securely, posing a security risk and contributing towards the dust and insects problem.

Food preparation area - We are required to line the ceiling in order to prevent any contaminants from falling on to food and also to keep the temperature down. We must also fit a hygienic board around the sink and food preparation area.

We are expfaining this in the hope that you will be understanding whilst the work is undertaken. We feel we would like to keep you up to date since your support during the last year has been so greatly appreciated and has given us the reassurance that we need for investing in the improvements. Conditions will not be easy whilst the work is in progress, but we are pleased to be able to proceed with these improvements which are largely in the interest of our customers. We intend to keep you up to date as things progress.

The locality Manager, Suzanne Jones, said we now have a more user friendly building which meets all the standards required and goes a long way to secure the future of a greatly improved community hospital which can meet our needs much better. I have, technically, been priest-in-charge of a loose conglomeration of parishes stretching from Walberswick to Covehithe and Benacre. The establishment of the actual Team Ministry had to be agreed by the Privy Council; this happened at their February meeting and the Order in Council takes effect from 1st March. As well as being St David's day 1st March is well into Lent and I hope you are managing to keep a good Lent and that those resolutions have not already collapsed! If we have not managed to keep up to what we hoped to do we can always start again, pick up that book we intended to read, spend those extra minutes each day in prayer, come along to the Wednesday Eucharist, attend the Lent Lunch in the village hall, come to the stations of the Cross on Tuesday evenings at the Church of The Holy Trinity, Bythburgh. 

The last meeting was held on Monday 8<sup>th</sup> February. The official minutes of meetings are displayed on the council notice board at the village hall and in the church porch. Further correspondence had been received from the Highways Department stating that if conditions are forecast to be particularly icy in the morning they would complete gritting Priority 2 routes by 0900. Mr Fisher reported that there was evidence that the roads were being gritted much earlier.

The new swings on the common and the slide on the village green were now in place. The Council agreed to pay Playscape £4,423.88 (including VAT). A considerable proportion of the cost would be returned to the council via grants from the Common Lands Trust and SCDC.

The Suffolk Constabulary reported that from 1<sup>st</sup> February Walberswick would be covered by the Leiston Sector. The Sector Commander is Inspector Mike Shields who could be contacted on 01986 835390. The Council were delighted to welcome back WPc Elaine Fulton, who was in attendance, as the Parish Officer. She can be contacted at either Saxmundham Police Station on 01728 602017 or Leiston Police Station on 01728 835406.

Mr Tibbles reported that the sports pavilion had been vandalised and that the culprits were believed to have come from outside the village. The incident was noted by WPc Fulton. WPc Fulton also requested that the Council inform the constabulary asap if any events were planned for New Year's Eve as they were concerned about manpower at that time.

Ideas for the millennium had been forthcoming and were discussed. It was felt that it would be necessary to form a management committee to coordinate events during the millennium year. The Council agreed to see if funds could be raised to hold a residents' champagne breakfast on Cliff Field, at sunrise, on New Year's morning. The Council agreed not to respond to the Suffolk Wildlife Trust's request for support in their joint bid with RSPB to acquire Dingle Marshes.



#### LETTER FROM THE TEAM RECTOR

Easter is the greatest of all Christian festivals because it celebrates the wonderful triumph of love over the forces of hatred, evil and death - a triumph which is the bedrock of our hope, our faith, our joy and our peace. If the events that we commemorate at this season did not happen then our whole faith is indeed in vain.

The events of Holy Week and Easter are, of course, closely linked to those which we celebrate at Christmas - it is, after all, the same God at work. At his nativity we remember God's self-giving love manifested in his son being born, as one of us, of the Virgin Mary, and now we celebrate that same love which would not give up in the face of vicious execution.

As we seek to go about our business as Christians in the world it is vital that we should reflect resurrection values in our own lives - the triumph of love over hatred, of generosity over greed, of big-heartedness over small-mindedness, of inclusivity over exclusivity, of joy over sorrow, and, in the end, of life over death. This is a tall order and, all too often, we Christians do not make a very good job of it. We can only reflect resurrection living if we allow God to be the the prime force moving in our lives and so we each need to ask ourselves daily to what extent our lives are truly Christ-centred and, thus, Christ-like.

This is our calling as Christians - to reflect the life of the risen Christ in the world of today. Of ourselves we cannot hope to do it, but with God's grace all things are truly possible. In the General Thanksgiving in the Book of Common Prayer we give thanks to God for "the means of grace" - let us ensure that we do not neglect these and, indeed, that we make good use of them. - the Scriptures, the Sacraments, the Fellowship of the Church, private prayer and that we may live lives committed to making real in our world today that love of God manifest in Mary's womb and also in the death and the resurrection of Jesus Christ - our Brother and our Saviour.



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### WALBERSWICK COMMON LANDS CHARITY - DISTRIBUTION OF CAR PARK PROFITS

Members of the Trust met representatives of the Parish council on the 25th February. This is a brief summary of the decisions reached:- Repairs to the Sports Pavilion,£3000; Village hall improvements,£2000; materials for wire cage reinforcements to Dunwich riverbanks,£2000; WCLC income distribution fund, £1500; Millennium Celebrations, £1500; Rewiring the church,£1000; Doctors' Car Rescue Service, £500; new noticeboard (weather protected) for Stocks Green, £500; Church Gate renovation,£300; Top up funds for minibus scheme until February 2000, £300; Christmas lights, £100; Repainting old 'Numerous Turnings' sign at village entrance, £100. A proposal for new scrapes to be dug on Old Town Marsh to encourage wildlife could be funded from £1321.62 not yet allocated. Richard Scott

#### THE BLYTH VALLEY COMPUTER SOCIETY

The Annual General Meeting of the Society was held at Primrose Cottage on 5th. March. The retiring Chairman Professor John Allen reported that the season had been very successful, including many memorable talks and that many useful suggestions for next season's programme had been received - also that the finances were on a sound footing. Martin Smith was elected as Chairman for the next year and the other existing committee members were re-elected.

Our President Ray Easterbrook thanked Professor Allen for the work he had done during his 3 years in Office and commented that during the 6 years of its existence the Society had gone from strength to strength. The meeting was then closed and the floor given to Robert Deakin of the Halcrow Group who spoke to us on the use of computers in shoreline management. Halcrow have carried out surveys of the East Anglian shoreline on behalf of Anglian Water and have a large database of geographic and geological observations taken over years from which they can analyse the causes of coastal erosion, suggest counter-measures, and predict future changes caused by the rising sea level on the East coast. This was the last meeting of our 1998/9 season and we shall reconvene in September to look further into the application of computing and its effects on society.

#### MINSMERE NEWS - FEBRUARY

The new West Hide is finished and opened to the public. On its opening day a little egret and a bittern fed close outside.

Two firecrests have been seen regularly. A first winter glaucous gull visited Island Mere on the 3rd; and a second winter Iceland gull was on the levels on the 2nd, 4th and 5th. Mediterranean gulls showed regularly, first and second winter and adult birds all being recorded. A Cetti's warbler remained in the Island Mere: a common buzzard was seen on the 6th. Up to 500 white-fronted geese split into two flocks, some feeding on the levels and some flying inland. A little egret was seen throughout the month.; two red head smew favoured the scrape near East Hide; and a Jack snipe showed well from East Hide on the 10th. A waxwing fed on hawthorn bushes near the North Wall on the 27th

#### ANNUAL BIRDSONG WALK

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#### **DINGLE MARSHES**

Derek Moore, a leading ornithologist and Director of the Suffolk Wildlife Trust(SWT) for 14 years, gave an illustrated talk about the Dingle Marshes at a public meeting in the Village Hall on the 25th March. He outlined the reason why the RSPB and SWT had joined forces to purchase this 636 acre stretch of wetland between Walberswick and Dunwich. With representatives of English Nature and the RSPB he answered questions from residents and visitors.

Mr Moore described the wildlife of Dingle Marshes, which has been protected for many years under private ownership and adjoins Walberswick National Nature Reserve. They are home for a variety of rare species, including the endangered bittern, the marsh harrier, water vole and little known sea anemone. There are numerous breeding waders, like avocets, redshanks and lapwings. A £1 million appeal was launched in January to cover the costs of purchase and of setting up the reserve to secure its future. The target is within reach, with grants of £559,000 from the lottery fund and £50,000 from English Nature.

Local residents were greatly concerned that a major new attraction for visitors would be created, bringing yet more severe traffic congestion in summer. In reply the RSPB and SWT emphasised their desire to keep visitor levels low, while respecting and caring for public paths. The RSPB has no intention at all of making it a second Minsmere. The marshes would be maintained much as they are now, with special care for the rare species.

It is hoped that a draft outline management plan will be available by the end of April. It will be circulated to Parish Councils for comment. #### LETTER FROM THE TEAM RECTOR

May is a full month in the life of the Church. As it draws to a close so does the season of Eastertide, throughout which we celebrate Jesus's victory over death. We should do this, above all else, by witnessing in whatever ways we can to that new life of his in which he invites each of us to share. We are able to do this through the Holy Spirit - the gift of whom we celebrate at Pentecost (or Whit Sunday). This falls on  $23^{rd}$  May and there will be a range of services throughout the Team.

On May 9th the Church celebrates Rogation Sunday, when we ask for God's blessing on the land and on all those who work on the land. We will be praying especially for all our local farmers, farm workers and others whose livelihood is dependent on the land. Times are very critical for all such members of the community and it is vital that we should do all we can to support them and to fight for the provision of decent services and amenities in rural areas. There will be a Team Service at St. Andrew's, Sotherton that day at 3:30 p.m., followed by a picnic. (It is situated in the heart of the countryside just to the west of the A145).

May 9th also marks the beginning of Christian Aid Week. During this week there will be house to house collections in some places and street collections in others. Do please give as generously as you can. Christian Aid manifests in a very concrete way some of the things that resurrection life is all about. Jesus said: "Whatever you do for one of the least of these you do for me" - supporting the work of Christian Aid ,with both our money and our prayers, is a valuable way of doing something for those living in dreadful poverty and struck down by disaster. Thank you to all who contributed so generously to the Kosovo Crisis Appeal around the Easter Weekend.

It is sometimes very difficult in the face of all the dreadful things going on in the world to believe that God really is in control and, if he is in control, that he is a God of love. Our response as Christians to this does not lie in slick and easy answers but in reflecting on the dreadful death of Jesus on the cross and on his subsequent resurrection from the dead, conquering sin, hatred, evil and all that would seek to belittle and destroy life. Faithful prayerfulness is a vital element in the quest to make sense of life. On 8th May there will be a Eucharist at St. Margaret's, Reydon at 9:00 a.m. as the Church commemorates one of the greatest examples of faithful prayerfulness - the great East Anglian Saint, Julian of Norwich, who, having reflected on Jesus's death and resurrection, uttered those famous words:

"All shall be well and all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well".

May this be your experience of life during these days of Eastertide and for ever more.



#### **MINSMERE - MARCH**

The first Summer visitors began arriving, with a drake garganey present on the levels on the 10th. The first sand martin arrived on the 14th. Three male wheatear were on the coastal path near the sluice bushes on the 24th. House martin arrived on the 26th, and the first swallows were seen on the 27th. A common sandpiper was also seen on the 27th.

Up to three bitterns were booming early in the month. White-fronted goose numbers peaked at 360 on the 5th, with 110 still present on the 14th. A single red kite flew north on the 15th and two were seen going north on the 19th. Two buzzards were seen on the fourth and from mid-month buzzards were seen almost daily. A single peregrine was seen on the 4th and the 5th. Three glaucous gulls were present on several dates and at least seven black redstarts moved through. A drake green-winged teal was on the levels on the 13th and on the 29th.

He was a skilled potter, one who works with clay. But I see him as one who worked with people - in his practice, in the Suffolk Crafts Society, in WATS and in his extended family of friends. He brought his "personal touch of creativity" to all these relationships and was "soft-spoken, wise, gentle, reassuring and humble" in his conduct of them. Always constructive, knocking copy was not in his book. His son memorably said of him "He had a heart that celebrated every event in life and made it into an occasion". I cannot remember Reggie being 'grey' about anything. He didn't just lend support - he got stuck in. He was a doer. The opportunity of making a change for the better was a thrill he couldn't resist. A casual mention that one's back door was dull brought sketches the following morning. No wonder that "I have never been bored" was his classic statement.

At this very sad time our deepest condolences go out to Heather and to her and Reggie's family. But to remember Reggie adequately we should do more - his life should be an inspiration to us all.

#### From the Team Rector

The beginning of June this year nearly coincides with the beginning of that long number of weeks in the Christian year when the liturgical colour is green. This may seem a point of little importance and indeed of great irrelevance in a world full of pain and disaster, with which to begin a monthly letter. Don't give up just yet!

The Sundays throughout the summer and autumn when we wear green are known as "Sundays after Trinity". Trinity Sunday - 30<sup>th</sup> May - is when Christians celebrate that great mystery at the heart of our understanding of God - that God is an indivisible unity and yet at the same time there are three persons in the godhead. No wonder it is called a mystery! I believe this understanding of the Divine instils in us the fact that "relationship" is at the very heart of godliness. The old Athanasian Creed tells us that in this relationship "there is no before or after: no greater or less", there is complete equality. Christians are committed to working for the building up of the Kingdom of God and struggling to co-operate in the development of human societies that reflect the values of that Kingdom. The Trinity and the nature of relationship within it is both our inspiration and our goal in this task.

This takes me back to the "green season". In the Catholic Church these Sundays are known as "Sundays in Ordinary Time" - i.e. they are not Sundays in Advent, Christmas, Lent or Easter. During this "ordinary time" what we need to do is to quietly get on working out the implications of our faith in our everyday living. We can do this in our personal relationships, in the views we form and develop about topical social and political issues both in our local community and on the national and international level. In the "special seasons" of the Church's year we have prepared for, and reflected on, the great events in the life of Jesus. In the "green season" let us ensure that we hallow ordinary time by affirming that all time is in fact "extra-ordinary" - a precious gift given us by God. Every minute that goes by is a minute that we will never have again - it is gone for ever. Every minute that goes by is a minute given us by God to make good use of. At the beginning of every day do we not need to pray for the grace to make good use of the minutes and hours that lie before us? At the end of every day do we not need to confess just how many of those minutes we have wasted or even put to some ungodly use, praying for the grace to do better tomorrow? Let each one of us seek to abandon ourselves to God that we may make good use of every minute of our lives - both the ordinary and the extra-ordinary. With every blessing.



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#### THE BRITISH RED CROSS - SUFFOLK BRANCH

Thank you very much indeed to everyone who so kindly and very generously responded to my appeal for donations to Kosovo. This raised £430 and was specifically used for the specially designed food parcels for the vulnerable and babies these are extremely necessary in the desperate prevailing circumstances. The Red Cross presence in the field now totals 14 people including a Relief Coordinator working with the Federation of Albania. The British Red Cross have set up a major pipeline of 30 trucks providing immediate basic hygiene to the International Red Cross in Albania, via Macedonia. Ten trucks of individual food parcels have been provided for the vulnerable in Yugoslavia. Eight Fiat vans, plus repair kits have been supplied to the Albanian Red Cross for use for aid and people-carrying. Trucks of aid, including 50 tonnes of sugar, 5,600 kitchen sets and 10,000 baby kits have been provided for existing and newly arrived refugees in Yugoslavia. The total British Red Cross expenditure to date amounts to approximately £4.6 million.

The Red Cross week in Walberswick has raised £277.21. Again, so very many thanks for everyone's generosity and particularly to all the kind helpers who worked to raise this wonderful amount.

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#### NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

The Annual Meeting of the Parish Council was held on Monday 10<sup>th</sup> May. The official minutes of meetings are displayed on the council notice board at the village hall and in the church porch.

The new Council is made up of the following: Mr K Webb (Chairman), Mr A Hunt (Vice Chairman), Mr R Buncombe, Mr J Brentnall, Mrs C Vernetti, Mr B Tibbles and Mr N Jones

The Chairman welcomed the new members to the Parish Council.

Outline planning permission had been granted by SCDC for the use of the land between Common Edge and Driftwood to erect one detached dwelling and garage. Planning permission had also been granted for the erection of a garage extension and vehicular access to Dunelm, Lodge Road, subject to conditions set out by SCDC. Planning permission had been refused for a two-storey extension to provide a granny annexe at Millfield House, Millfield Road.

The Clerk had received estimates for safety surfacing for the swings on the common and play area on the Village Green. The cost of approximately £6,500 was considered to be out of the question and the Council elected to get the main work completed within the community and obtain further quotes for the supply of the safety tiles required for the areas. Mr Buncombe agreed to be the Parish Council representative to the Suffolk Association of Local Councils and Mr Hunt the representative on the Village Hall Management Committee.

Mr Tibbles agreed to undertake monthly checks of the play equipment. The election of two further Nominative Trustees to the Charity Trust would be advertised.

Concern about damage to the beach by campers was discussed. It was agreed to write to Sir Charles Blois on this subject. The question of improving the footpaths at the bottom end of Stocks Lane and in the vicinity of the Mill was also addressed. It was agreed to contact Suffolk Coasts and Heaths to assist in these areas.



#### LETTER FROM THE TEAM RECTOR

July is the month when the schools break up for their summer holidays and the holiday season really gets under way. The word "Holidays" does, in fact come from "Holy Days", originally the only holidays. In the Calendar of the Church of England there are a good number of such days during July, reflecting the wide diversity of Christian heroes and role models. There is a lot in the media these days about the kind of role models we have, especially for our young people.

Here is a selection of July's heroes:

- 1 John and Henry Venn, Evangelical Divines. This father and son were instrumental in the establishment of the Church Missionary Society. John played a leading role in working for the abolition of the legalised slave trade.
- 3 Thomas the Apostle. Thomas is usually remembered as "Doubting Thomas" but he is also the one who knelt at his Lord's feet and said "My Lord and my God". What a wonderful short prayer of adoration to have on our lips every day and especially when we meet at the Altar.
- 6 Thomas More and John Fisher. Martyrs of the Reformation More was a great humanist scholar and Lord Chancellor and Fisher was a brilliant and saintly Bishop of Rochester.
- 11 Benedict. Religious. Benedict was born in Italy around the year 480 and is known as the Father of Western Monasticism. His Rule is a spiritual masterpiece and well worth reading by anyone seeking to grow in the spiritual life.
- 14 John Keble, Priest and Poet. He was a leading member of the Oxford Movement in the nineteenth century, which sought to recover the catholic heritage of the Church of England and enrich its liturgy. Many of his hymns are still sung today.
- 15 Swithun, Bishop of Winchester. Swithun lived in the ninth century. He was an advisor of King Egbert and had a great love for the poor of his diocese.

That is just the first half of the month! We also remember Buenaventura, Friar and Bishop (15), Osmund, Bishop of Salisbury (16), Elizabeth Ferard, first Deaconess of the Church of England (18), Gregory of Nyssa and his sister, Macrina (19), Margaret of Antioch (20), Bartolomé de las Casas, Apostle to the Indies (20), Mary Magdalene (22), Bridget of Sweden, Abbess (23), James the Apostle (25), Anne and Joachim, parents of the BVM (26). Mary, Martha and Lazarus, companions of Jesus (29), William Wilberforce, Social Reformer (30) and Ignatius Loyola, Founder of the Jesuits (31).

What a list of heroes we have - and this is just for July! If only we look at our tradition we have many, many heroes and role models and there are also many more alive and seeking to do God's work today in lands across the globe.

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April's run of good birds continued into May, but it was definitely a case of qual-Robin Buncombe ity not quantity. This year's wader passage was distinctly thin, however, 25 species were recorded including: curlew, sandpiper. (7th), little ringed plover (19th and 28th), wood sandpiper (29th) and a terek sandpiper (27th and 28th) Up to 5 little egrets were seen irregularly from 5th, with spoonbills on 10th, 11th, 19th and 29th. Migrating raptors included another late hen harrier (6th), buzzard (12th, with 2 on 19th), osprey (14th, 15th and 31st) and a ringtail Montagu's harrier on 15th. Two gargeney were seen occasionally from the 22nd and there was an unseasonal red breasted merganser on the Scrape on the 28th. Also on the Scrape were three little gulls and 5 mediterranean gulls, and a roseate term roosted with common terns on the 30th.

> A pair of golden orioles around Canopy Hide from the 16th added a dash of colour. Other small birds of note included wood warbler, whinchat and marsh warbler.

### WALBERSWICK BIRD SONG WALK - MAY 1<sup>ST</sup> 1999

An altogether highly successful morning's birding. With no less than 25 people gathering at the Hoist Covert car park, that one vital commodity, ears, were in abundance. A beautiful soft morning, no wind, and a light dusting of cloud that was soon banished by the rising sun. A grand total of 52 species were seen or heard during the two hour walk. Starting off at the Hoist, summer migrants such as chiffchaff, willow warbler and that irrepressible songster, the nightingale were soon added to our list. A far off green woodpecker drummed whilst yellowhammers and skylarks filled the background with their songs. Along by the old mill the boom of a bittern was briefly heard, jet propelled bearded tits 'pinged' their way over the reed beds and marsh harriers wafted by in a more becoming and sedately manner. Hidden reed and sedge warblers teased everyone with their similar songs. Returning up the eastern side of the covert, we were at one point seemingly enveloped by a cacophony of sound - as whitethroats, lesser whitethroats, blackcaps, nightingales and many of the commoner species vied for air space. The morning's proceeds, £30, was evenly divided and passed onto the two beneficiaries, Suffolk Wildlife and Walberswick Church. Finally I am sure you will all join me in offering our sincere thanks to David Sheriff, who has for many years organised and led this annual Bird Song Walk.

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#### NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

The last meeting was held on Monday 7<sup>th</sup> June. The official minutes of meetings are displayed on the council noticeboard at the Village Hall and in the church porch. Planning permission had been granted by SCDC for the erection of one detached dwelling and garage at the rear of Old Vicarage Cottage subject to the development being carried out in accordance with the plans and information contained in the application. The Council were extremely disappointed that this application had been approved having been turned down by SCDC three times previously.

The Council approved the accounts for the year 1<sup>st</sup> April 1998 to 31<sup>st</sup> March 1999. The accounts and related documents are available for public inspection by appointment with the Clerk (Tel: 723142) from 14<sup>th</sup> June to 2<sup>nd</sup> July. Mr Buncombe was appointed as the Responsible Finance Officer for the current year.

SALC had written to the Council asking them if they wished to pursue their dialogue with the Minister for Local Government and Housing for ending the reduction of 50% Council Tax which is applied to second or holiday homes. As approximately 30% of homes in the village received this reduction, which meant people actually living in the village had to pay more Council Tax, the Parish Council agreed to ask SALC to continue to press for this action.

The Council were dismayed that a young local couple had been refused entry on to the waiting list for housing in the village because the Housing Association stated that they only qualified for one bedroomed accommodation and there were none available in the village. The Chairman stated that the Council had worked tirelessly 12 years ago to obtain housing primarily to keep young people in the village. It was agreed to write to the Housing Association to arrange a meeting to resolve this situation.

There were six applications for two Nominative Trustees to The Walberswick Common Lands Charity. After discussion and a secret ballot Mr Nigel Hunt and Mr Gerald Tooley were elected to serve on the Trust for a period of four years.

Problems of vandalism and unauthorised camping on the beach were discussed. The Council suggested that members of the public should contact Sir Charles Blois on 01728 648200 if they notice people camping out of season on his land (The season commences last week in July for 42 days only). Disturbances on the beach should also be reported to the police immediately.

The Chairman reported that repairs to the pavilion were due to commence shortly. The situation regarding vandalism to the pavilion would be monitored. If anyone knows who these vandals are please inform a Councillor or the police. We can only keep the skateboard ramp in the village, for the young people of Walberswick, if this wilful destruction is stamped out. If anyone sees vandalism taking place please contact the police immediately.

The next meeting will be held on Monday 5<sup>th</sup> July at 7.30pm in the annexe of the Village Hall.



#### LETTERFROM THE TEAM RECTOR

You will not have failed to notice that the tower of St. Andrew's has been shrouded in scaffolding for several weeks now and this is likely to be so, for some time. The architect has discovered serious problems that must be put right as soon as possible. The work will be done in two stages and will not be completed until next year. The tower of our Church has stood as a beacon of the faith for many centuries - it can be seen from far and wide alongside its sisters at Blythburgh, Reydon and Southwold. These towers stand as reminders of the faith and as pointers to God.

Such reminders and pointers play valuable roles in our lives as Christians. In the Church's calendar we have the saints and last month I wrote about several of them whom we commemorated in July. In the revised calendar of the Church of England we have joined with most of the rest of the Christian world that celebrates the lives of the saints in keeping 15th August as the day we remember Mary, the Mother of Jesus.

Mary is our example in faith - for as a young woman she uttered those famous words to God in the presence of Gabriel the Archangel - "Be it done unto me according to thy will". These words sum up what faith is all about - being willing to place ourselves totally, and humbly, in the hands of God, trusting that in his hands that "all shall be well". There is not a lot about Mary in the Scriptures, but what there is speaks volumes. She stands in the great list of Hebrew women of faith - often forgotten and ignored by the tradition but playing essential roles - women such as Miriam, Esther, Deborah, Ruth and Rahab. She was there at the very beginning of Jesus's life on earth as the woman chosen, above all others to bear his only Son. She was there at he beginning of his public ministry, when he performed the first of his miracles at the Wedding at Cana. This miracle was performed at her intercession. She was there at the very end, standing at the foot of the Cross with the Beloved Disciple. She was there with the disciples on that day of Pentecost when the Spirit came in great power upon the Church.

Mary remained faithful and obedient to the end in spite of the great pain this must have caused her at times and the many questions that must have troubled her. Let her be our sign as a symbol of faithfulness and humility as we progress on our Christian pilgrimage to the grave and beyond. With every blessing,

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#### MINSMERE RESERVE

The North Levels Wetland Creation Project - the creation of 35 hectares(80 acres) of mixed reed bed, open water and very wet grazing marsh between the main reed bed and the New Cut should eventually support good numbers of breeding waders and ducks and, importantly, bitterns. The planning process was given a big boost by two female bitterns which took to feeding in the Tarpan field.

After the 'doom and gloom' of last month bitterns are now heading for a bumper season, with no less than 8 nests! Unfortunately the same can't be said about avocets which continue to suffer from predation. Three chicks are close to fledging but we are not overly hopeful that many more will make it though there are still 30+ pairs sitting.

June continued the run of good birds with honey buzzard, red-necked phalarope, purple heron, osprey, red-footed falcon and marsh warbler, whilst 'autumn' wader migration got underway with the first returning spotted redshank, followed by rough, green sandpiper and small parties of curlew almost daily from mid-month.



In truth, however, the spiritual, should be the most urgent for it is that, above all else, that determines the kind of person we are. The spiritual is concerned with our inner being - the being that is still there when all else is stripped away. People of different faiths and people who are agnostic or atheist will go about this in different ways and it is important that we respect other people's approaches rather than trying to fit everyone into the same mould. It is far more important for us to look at our own lives than to be distracted by spending time criticising others. Christians will do this by spending time with the Bible, by sharing in the sacramental life of the Church, by being faithful in their private prayer lives and by living lives in the service of others. If we allow God truly to take control of lives we will discover hidden depths and meaning to life - for in his service we discover perfect freedom and everlasting joy and peace.

As life returns back to the normal routine may we each know within our hearts that joy, peace and love which it is God's desire we each should revel in every day of our lives.

### SOUTHWOLD **VOLUNTARY HELP CENTRE**

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### WALBERSWICK PARISH COUNCIL

Southwold Town Council requested permission to place three boundary stones on the Walberswick side of the river, to mark the millennium. Mr Burrage produced designs for the stones and showed them to the Councillors. The Parish Council had no objection to the request. The inauguration of the stones will take place on 24th June 2000 at 5.45 pm. Further explanation was received from SCDC concerning the demolition of the original dwelling at Quiet Ways and the granting of planning permission at the back of Old Vicarage Cottage. The letter from SCDC will be placed on notice board, outside the Village Hall

SCDC has granted £800 to the Council towards the cost of safety surfacing to the play areas.

A seat in the village has been destroyed by vandals; the insurance company is prepared to replace the seat up to a value of £300, but the excess is £100. Two residents have expressed an interest in sponsoring a new seat.

The Council received a request for a motorcycle road run across the common and Bailey Bridge on August 29th, but it was considered too dangerous.

The Council received consultation leaflets concerning The Sandlings Walks Project; the Council will meet with the Countryside Officer to discuss rights of way around the village. The Council were extremely disappointed at the lack of support from the police in maintaining the traffic regulations; however it was felt that the policing on the Crabbing Day had been a success. The clerk was asked to write to the police to express the council's views.

Fewer problems have been reported since the campsite had been officially opened. Further camping issues were discussed and a meeting will be arranged between Sir Charles and Lady Blois, the Police, the Parish Council and the Charity Trust at the end of the season. Matters raised by Members included the ambiguity of the Conservative fete posters, the amount of bottles being left in boxes around the bottle bank at the Anchor, the continued monitoring of the pavilion and splinters in the skateboard ramp.



### SUBURBIA COMES TO THE MARSHES

Part of the footpath from the Old Mill towards the caravan site at Walberswick has been covered with planking. This may be suitable for an Urban Park but it is totally out of place in an area of outstanding natural beauty!

The reason for this hideous piece of work is that the footpath has been flooded and difficult to use.

The cause of the flooding is that the drainage channels taking the water from the marshes have been deliberately blocked, allowing the level of the water to rise to what is probably its highest level in living memory. This should never have been allowed. In the absence of any information to the contrary, there must be a suspicion that commercial interests have been allowed to spoil this area of outstanding natural beauty.

As I see it the solution to the problem, if it is essential to allow the higher level of water in the reed-beds, is to make drainage channels alongside, and parallel to, the path to prevent the water flooding the path and to allow this water to flow away to the deep water channels which already flow under bridges to the river. This should be less expensive and preserve the natural beauty of the

Is it too much to hope that a sensitive solution can be provided and this hideous wooden planking removed?

It is worth noting that the planking has been put over a section of the footpath where the higher level of the water makes the going difficult. Nothing has been done to the section nearer the caravan site where the flooding is much worse and the path completely impassable without wellington boots. Peter Taylor

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Day and Night Service

WALBERSWICK PARISH COUNCIL

The last meeting was held on Monday 6<sup>th</sup> September. The official minutes of meetings are displayed on the council notice board at the Village Hall and in the church porch.

An appeal against the decision made by Suffolk Coastal to refuse planning permission for a granny annexe at Millfield House, Millfield Road had been dismissed by the Planning Inspectorate.

A long discussion took place on a) Speed and intensity of traffic through the village and the resulting threat to pedestrians and cyclists, and b) Preservation of the village. The Vice Chairman, Mr Hunt explained that as Car Parks' Manager he always erected a sign at Blythburgh crossroads as soon as the car parks reached their capacity and then immediately informed the police of the situation in the village. Unfortunately, this summer Traffic Wardens had rarely come to the village at busy times and the police had not been as supportive as in previous years. This was a major problem for the village, particularly in the area of the green, as the traffic regulations were only as good as their enforcement.

Further discussions took place on the merits of humps in the road, road narrowing, rumble strips, markings on the road etc. to aid speed reduction in the village, especially along the stretch from the outsleits to the church. It was unanimously resolved to invite the Visitor Management Working Group to review the situation. Proposals and ways forward would then be discussed at the next meeting.

The question of fishing nets being placed too near to the beach endangering swimmers was also raised. This would be reported to the Marine Safety Agency. Flooding in Leveretts Lane and the condition of footpath 11 would also be reported to the appropriate departments at Suffolk County Council.

The next meeting will be held on Monday 4<sup>th</sup> October at 7.30pm in the annexe of the Village Hall.

### YOUR COMMON NEEDS YOU! VOLUNTEERS WANTED

A review of work for the coming season will take place this month in conjunction with the Common Lands Charity and Suffolk Wildlife Trust. The regeneration of heather during the previous season has been particularly good, due to the favourable weather conditions and the work of the volunteers. It is essential that this continues. ### PARISH COUNCIL MEETING 4TH OCTOBER

Full minutes will be displayed on the usual noticeboards.

There were two planning applications this month. There is a plan to convert Mary's Restaurant into 6 dwellings for elderly and disabled people; this would involve the demolition of part of the single storey at the rear and the conversion of outbuildings. The council had reservations, namely: the proposed layout appears to overcrowd the site; if permission is granted restrictions should be stipulated to ensure that the dwellings should not be used as a second or holiday homes or sold on as such; preference should be given to Walberswick residents. Four councillors had no objection in principal to the application, one abstained and one objected. There was a retrospective application for alterations and extensions to Poplar Cottage Annexe. The Council was concerned about the unauthorised installation of six Velux windows and other changes in the fenestration and roof design without planning consent especially as this is not the first time this has happened in the village. The Council agreed to write to SCDC and ask them what action they would be taking. The Village Management Group has been re-formed, it will consist of Mr Robin Buncombe, Mr Alvin Hunt, Miss Barbara Priestman, Mrs Jane Gomm and Mr A. Walpole. Further members could be co-opted if necessary.

The Lionheart Sponsored Walk has written to the Parish Council to express gratitude to the car park attendant Mr John Minney for his help and friendly service. Other issues raised by members included: the resurfacing of Ferry Road Car Park; the shoring up of the banks of the Dunwich River and bringing the surfacing of the play equipment up to standard. Next meeting Monday 1st November.

MEETING WITH MEMBERS OF THE SANDLINGS WALK PROJECT A meeting was held with the members of the Parish Council on 13<sup>th</sup> September. There is a plan is to create a long distance path between Ipswich and Southwold. The planned route involving Walberswick will pass on the outskirts of the village. Concerns were voiced about bikes using the footpaths and people not understanding breeding seasons. It was suggested that the Heritage Hut could provide information and get children more interested. The poor state of the footpaths at the bottom of Stocks Lane and through the marshes near Seven Acre Field were discussed and will be looked into. Unauthorised camping, beach bonfires, and vandalism to beach huts were also discussed. It was suggested that the village should have a management agreement with the Landowners and produce a set of by-laws for the beach area. There is a model set of by-laws available and these could be passed quickly. However if the Parish needed to modify them in any way this would take considerably longer. WDC have their own by-laws which state that fishing nets must be placed 150 metres from the low water mark from May to September to



### THE BLYTH VALLEY COMPUTER SOCIETY

Our meeting on Friday October 8th was held at The Port of Felixstowe by kind invitation of the management, for a talk on the scheduling and control of container movements, followed by a tour of the computer suite. Andy Free the Information Systems manager showed a short video of the activities of the port and then gave a detailed presentation of the development of the site to its present position as Britain's largest container port. Giant cranes unload containers from ships which can hold up to 7000, these may be transferred to another ship or parked awaiting delivery by train or truck. More containers will be arriving by rail and road, day and night. Typically 40,000 containers will be in the park at any time and each of the many mobile cranes will move 20 containers per hour. To achieve these results total reliance is placed on computers to log the position and destination of each container, and the nature of its contents. Other programmes are used to schedule the movement of cranes within the park and to plan the loading pattern for outgoing ships so that those required first are at the top of the stack. In addition relevant data is made available to the Shipper, the Purchaser, other affected Ports, the Customs and the Police.

After dealing with many questions Mr Free invited us to partake of a splendid finger buffet before he showed us round the Computer Suite and control room, from which all activities are monitored 24 hours a day. All the software used was developed in house, a mammoth task! At our next meeting on November 12th, Hedley Griffin whose work has been screened on TV will talk to us on Cartooning with Computers. An evening not to be missed.





The meeting took place on Monday 1<sup>st</sup> November. The official minutes will be posted on the usual noticeboards. Please note that the official minutes do not appear until after the next Parish Council meeting has taken place.

### Planning applications

The Council received 3 applications this month: for a garden room and summerhouse at St Francis Seven Acre Lane (the Clerk and Vice Chairman declared an interest as owners of the property); an extension to a wet fish shop in Southwold Harbour; and an extension to the side and rear of Pyghtle, The Street. The Council had no objections to the 3 applications.

### **Bus Shelter**

The Council received a request for a bus shelter at the end of Adams Lane. It was felt that this would be unsafe because of the close proximity to a bend and that it would be safer to use the bus shelter at the end of Church Lane.

### **Poplar Cottage Annexe**

The owner of Poplar Cottage wrote to the Council to apologise for retrospective building. He had understood from his agent that the plan to renew rather than renovate the building had been covered by the planning permission. The Council appreciated Mr Murphy's writing.

### Visitor Management Group

The Visitor Management Group is due to meet with Inspector Shields during their December meeting. Mr Buncombe said their November meeting would discuss traffic management, control and enforcement.

### **Allotment Rents**

It was unanimously agreed that there be no rent increase for the allotments. A full allotment would remain at £11.00 and half allotment at £8.00.

### Singing Round the Tree

Christmas Carol singing around the tree will be on Monday 20<sup>th</sup> December at 7 pm.

### The Sports Field

Repair of the sports pavilion is in progress, the new floors are almost in place. It was agreed that it was unfeasible and uneconomical to repair the skateboard ramp. Replacement would cost at least £8, 000. It was decided to dismantle the skateboard ramp. The Clerk had been informed that gorse was growing around the swings on the Common. The trustees will be contacted.

### The Bailey Bridge Road

The Clerk received a request for the verges on the Bailey Bridge Road to be cut. It was agreed to contact the Highways Department.

### CHRISTMAS MESSAGE FROM THE TEAM RECTOR

"God so loved the world that he gave his only-begotten Son so that all who believe in him might not perish but have eternal life."

This is the wonderful good news that we celebrate at Christmas, when we recall the birth of Jesus Christ of the Blessed Virgin Mary. God loved us so much, and cared for us so much, that he revealed the depth of that love by giving us his only Son to live among us, as one of us. He became a human being exactly like you and me. He did not cling to his equality with God but assumed our human condition so he could demonstrate that there were absolutely no limits to his love. His humbling of himself in the womb of His Mother finds its fulfilment, of course, in the ultimate self-offering on the Tree of Calvary. 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### WALBERSWICK COMMON LANDS CHARITY

- 1) The Trustees accepted the following recommendations from the Land and Property and Incomes Distributions Sub-Committees:
- A. All Trust land and property would be inspected annually to ensure proper management and to identify the need for repairs and improvements.
- B. The boundary between Cliff Field and the Campsite would be defined with two concrete posts and paving slabs.
- C. Additional publicity regarding the Trusts work would be put on Village noticeboards and in the Village News.
- D. A policy for the repayment of loans would be drawn up.
- 2) Mr Tooley (Chairman of Walberswick Car Parks) reported a good year for the car parks. Bonuses had been paid to staff. An audit of the company's accounts would be carried out shortly. The grass verge alongside Cliff Field approach road had been tidied up.
- 3) The annual inspection of the common had been carried out, with Suffolk Wildlife Trust and Mr Horsey the volunteer warden. S.W.T would produce work plans for the Winter months.
- 4) A revised quote for much larger bird scrapes on Old Town Marshes was discussed. However, as the quote was £2200.00 higher than the original quote of £800, it was felt that it would be hard to justify the expenditure. Alternative quotes would be sought.
- 5) The Trustees plan to meet with a representative of the Charities Commission in December to discuss the distribution of profits from the car parking. They are anxious to ensure that the distribution meets statutory requirements.
