WALBERSWICK PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Monday 1st December 2003.

Apologies were received from the Clerk, Mrs V Hunt, and Mr K Webb. There was a declaration of interest in the planning application for Lima Cottage from Mr B Tibbles who left the room when the Council discussed the issue. The planning application for the construction of a timber balcony to the back of Lima Cottage was agreed. The application for the construction of a conservatory to Mill would be more appropriate in the Conservation Area. Suffolk Coastal District Council has refused the planning applications for 2 Anchor Cottages and The Workshop, The Lea.

An increase to the salary for the Parish Clerk was agreed in line with current recommendations. The Parish Council's representatives on the Estuarine Consultation Group would be Mr K Webb and Mr D Webb. A copy of the revised Electoral Register would be held by the Clerk and is subject to the Data Protection act. It was reported by Mr R Leighton, County and District Councillor, that the subject of an increase in the council tax for second home owners was being discussed by the County and District Councils and is likely to be agreed to be set at 90% of the full amount. Any increase would be unlikely to have any direct fiscal impact on the village.



A JOLLY EVENING ON LOCAL GOVERNMENT

A very large number of us in this village turns out to vote in national elections. Far fewer of us bother to take an interest in local elections - for the District Council or for the County Council. Few of us know the difference between them, nor have much of a clue about what they do or, if we are honest, care much about them.

Yet these bodies, and the people in them, have a much more direct influence on our lives than our national government. The District Council prepares the plan which determines the size and shape of our Village; the County Council runs all the schools - except those which are private. In short, their powers are enormous, the money they spend (witness our Council Tax bills) is huge, and the people whom we elect to sit on these councils are very Important Indeed. On Friday 19th March at 7.30 pm in the Village Hall three of these people, Jeremy Pembroke and Peter Aldous, from the County Council, and our own Rae Leighton who is on the County and the District Councils, will give a talk, lead a discussion and answer questions on what these councils do and how they set about doing it. Although this meeting has been arranged by the Conservative Branch in the village it is open to everyone and will be non-political. It is a genuine attempt to explain and to engender interest. NOTES FROM THE WALBERSWICK PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Mr D Webb had attended a meeting to discuss the Suffolk Estuary Strategy. He reported that no decisions had been made as yet; however topographical and hydrographical material had been collected and a computer model would be formulated. Mr Webb stated that he had joined a group to look at the model which would predict water levels in the estuary . The Chairman reported that £316.00 had been raised for the Children's Society as a result of the carol service on the Green and carol singing around the village on Christmas Eve. Thanks were extended to Mr Peter Avis for taking the service round the tree.

Planning – The Councillors were concerned that a planning application for the erection of a two-storey extension to 3, Lorne Cottages, would have a large visual impact on the corner of the Village Green which has been the subject of many paintings over the years and was in a Conservation Area. They agreed to ask the Development Control Committee to visit the site before making a decision on the application. Suffolk Coastal has refused the relocation of a vehicular access towards the east boundary at De Cressey's Restaurant because it would place the access very close to a group of beech trees protected by a Tree Preservation Order.

Sea Defences – The recent breach of the sea wall was discussed and a letter will be sent to the Environment Agency asking them to press on with the promised planting of marram grass and the fencing of further areas at risk on the beach. They would also be asked to look at the considerable erosion at the point where the Creek meets the River Blyth, and the sluice bridge which did not appear to be functioning correctly. Mrs Dabbs was concerned that there was not a register of people who might need help in an emergency. This would be placed on the next agenda. The state of the footpaths and River Wall path would be reported to the Highways Department. Beach huts had been vandalised over the Christmas period. Complaints had also been received about unauthorised firework displays.

Please note that next month's meeting will be held on 9th February due to the pantomime taking over the annexe.

A LOCAL HERO

Anyone who has read Suffolk Memories will be aware of the vital part so many local people played in the Second World War. When I mentioned the book to a good friend of mine he told me the story of his father Peter Wright who was the tenant farmer at Church Farm, Blythburgh, until 1990 when he died. The citation below tells the story of how Peter won the DCM which shortly afterwards was upgraded to the Victoria Cross by order of the King, an unprecedented occurrence, reward for uncommon valour.

CITATION.


'(Company sergeant Major) Peter Harold Wright Coldstream Guards'

In Italy on the 25th September 1943, the 3rd Battalion Coldstream Guards attacked the Pagliarolli feature, a steep wooded hill near Salerno. Before it reached the crest, the right hand company was held up by heavy spandau and mortar fire and all the officers had become casualties. CSM Wright, seeing that his company was held up, went forward to see what could be done. Finding that there were no officers left he immediately took charge and crawled forward by himself to see what the opposition was like. He returned with the information that three spandau posts were holding them up. He collected a section and put it into a position where it could give covering fire. Single-handed he then attacked each post in turn with hand grenades and bayonet silencing each. He then lead the Company on to the crest but realised that the enemy fire made this position untenable. CSM Wright therefore led them a short way down the hill and up on to the objective from a different direction. Entirely regardless of enemy fire, which was very heavy, CSM Wright then reorganised what was left of the company and placed them into position to consolidate the objective. Soon afterwards the enemy launched a counter attack which was fully beaten off. Later, with complete disregard of heavy enemy shell fire on the area of company headquarters and the reverse slopes of the hill and of gun fire from the slopes on the left of the position, he brought up extra ammunition and distributed it to the company. It is due to this Warrant Offlcer's superb disregard of the enemy's fire, his magnificent leadership, and his outstanding heroism throughout the action that his battalion succeeded in capturing and maintaining its hold on this very important objective.

On Ash Wednesday, 25th February, at 10.00 am., we will combine our regular midweek Communion service with the ancient practice of marking our foreheads in the form of a cross with ashes (obtained by burning the palm crosses that were given to people at the previous year's Palm Sunday services). If this sounds more than a little odd to non-churchgoers, it is a symbolic act of penitence for the sins we have committed, and leads us right into Lent. It could be worse; in the early church it was the practice for church members to begin their period of public penitence sprinkled with ashes and wearing sackcloth!

After last year's successful series of Sunday evening Lent lectures in Southwold, there is to be a further series this year; the theme will be 'Christian ethics' with Prof. Hugh Williamson as the first speaker on 29th February, at 6.00 pm. in the Southwold URC Church. All are welcome.

Robert Temple, British Telecom's Chief Security architect, talked to us about the protection of electronic communication over the internet which is at the heart of all activity in the world today. WALBERSWICK PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Affordable Housing - Messrs D and K Webb attended a meeting to discuss 'Affordable Housing'. Mr D Webb stated that the Countryside Agency would help fund a housing needs survey if it was part of the Parish Plan. If the survey confirmed a need, the Parish Council would then select a Housing Association to work with and then form a project team. Affordable housing may be for both young, local people and also older people wishing to 'down-size'. A scheme may take up to four years to complete. Anybody interested in this type of scheme should contact the Clerk (Tel: 723142).

The Environment Agency informed the Council that in view of the recent expenditure on emergency sea defence works, money may now not be available to finish the fencing and sewing of marram grass where needed on the beach this year.

<u>Planning</u> – The Council supported an application for the erection of a single-storey extension to Coronation Cottage and the erection of a two-storey and single-storey extension plus detached double garage at Troy, Church Field. However, they opposed the erection of two detached dwellings (demolition of existing house) at The Studio, Stocks Lane. They also opposed the revised application for Rose End Cottage, The Street.

SCDC have approved the erection of a two-storey extension to 3, Lorne Cottages, but opposed the erection of a balcony to Lima Cottage, Ferry Road.

Blyth Estuary Strategy Public Exhibition - A public exhibition has been arranged by the Environment Agency and will be held on 24th February at the Beachcomber Room at Southwold Pier to present the range of options being considered for the Blyth Estuary Flood management Strategy.

The next meeting will be held on Monday, 1st March 2004.

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

There were five planning applications on the agenda this month: 1) Mill Cottage, application to build a wooden conservatory on the south elevation; the Parish Council supported this application. 2) 2, Lorne Cottages, application for the erection of two-storey rear extension, rear dormer window and front conservation roof light, (Mr. K Webb declared a personal interest, left the room, and took no part in the discussions). The Councillors opposed this application because it would overlook No's. 1 and 3 Lorne Cottages; the windows would only be two feet away from the opening windows of the two affected cottages. 3) The Workshop, The Lea, application to replace the workshop with one-bedroomed holiday bungalow. The Parish Council opposed this application because it had made no provision for parking. This corner of the green is renowned for parking problems especially at holiday times. Having a new building specifically for holiday lets would exacerbate the problem. 4) Westwood, Lodge Road, application to construct dormers in roof on south elevation and insert three roof lights in roof on north elevation. The Council had no objections to the roof lights but opposed the dormers as they considered this would destroy the roofline and balance of a house situated in a conservation area. 5) Westwood, Lodge Road, application to build a house in part side garden of Westwood. The Councillors opposed this application because to build a house in this beautiful garden with historic interest would result in wanton destruction of this garden. The whole site is situated in a conservation area. The houses are all well spaced in this area and to allow this proposal would result in overmassing. The house is also out of character with the rest of the houses in that locality.

It was agreed that one of the Councillors should attend a conference on 18th March to discuss the sea level rise and sea defences in the Southern North Sea. Permission was granted for a collection to be made in aid of 'Save the Children' on the Village Green on Sunday 9th May.

The Car Park Company has now been operating as part of the Walberswick Visitor Management Scheme for seven years. At the Annual General Meeting of the Board of Directors on the 20th February Gerald Tooley stood down as Chairman of the Board but remains a Director. Rae Leighton was appointed as Chairman for the next year. All profits from the operation of the car parks are covenanted at the end of each season to the Walberswick Common Lands Charity. This last year, helped by extremely clement weather, the Company made a profit of £24,735 which, together with a rent of £3,756, will be paid to the Common Lands Charity. In total over the seven years of operation the Car Park Company Will have made available to the Charity over £134,000. The Company employs up to twelve local people each year as car park attendants, together with a salaried Operations Manager, Robin Buncombe. The Company is registered as a Private Limited Company at Company House and the Company Secretary is

May 2004 sees the launch of a major fund-raising initiative for St Andrew's Church. Since we became part of the Sole Bay Team in 1999 and the Vicarage was sold, the Parochial Church Council has been exploring ideas for enhancing the amenities of the Church, both for parishioners and visitors. We have now received approval for plans to install an equal-access toilet in a small out-building at the base of the tower. This will involve renovation work, installation of drainage and water pipes and the creation of a doorway through into the small area by the Vicar's vestry so that the toilet is accessible from inside the Church. St Andrew's is a much-loved building that has served the community for over 500 years; it is visited by many people each year for its historic interest and the peaceful atmosphere that is found there. Any building work therefore has to be sympathetically carried out by skilled craftsmen. Bearing that in mind and knowing that building costs are soaring, we calculate that the project will cost around £50,000. Money from the sale of the old Vicarage has provided us with a sound basis for our fund-raising, but if we are to see the project through we need to raise a further £25,000. On Saturday 29th May at 6.00pm we will be launching our appeal in St Andrew's; we hope that as many of you as possible will come to the Church to see the plans, meet the architect and the WC Committee and have a glass of wine. We have many ideas (some already in place) for fund-raising; we hope you will support us in whatever way you can. We will be sending out more details of the launch soon, but the quicker that we raise the money, the sooner the builders can start work; the equal-access toilet will then be there 'For Your Convenience'!

Lorry Haslegrave and I would like to thank all those who were able to find the time to reply to our letter. The additional notes included in many of the replies were much appreciated. As at 14th May, 51% (194) of the estimated number of people who live full time in Walberswick had replied, and replies are still trickling in. 4% had no strong feelings either way. Those we deducted from the total. Of the remainder, 3% said NO and the remainder said that they supported the introduction of a speed calming scheme. In our letter we gave an example of a scheme already in place in Waldringfield, but we did not suggest what scheme would be most suitable for Walberswick. We wrote to the Chairman of the Parish Council on 7th May with the statistics that we had at that time, and the matter was raised at their Meeting on the 10th May. The Council agreed to invite an expert in traffic calming to visit Walberswick and give them advice on how they should proceed. Note: In our statistics, we have assumed that those who did not reply had no strong feeling one way or the other, or had simply lost the letter. Thank you again. Alan Walpole and Lorry Haslegrave.

VISITOR MANAGEMENT POLICY

I have become increasingly exasperated and angered over actions taken and views expressed, by some, regarding speeding vehicles and parking problems in the village.

Your Council duly regards each issue and takes appropriate actions, as it deems necessary.

Too many, however, have lost sight of the fact that the village has a comprehensive Visitor Management Policy, originating from 1995. Don't forget that all too often, before the implementation of the Policy, horrendous problems were experienced.

After a specially convened Parish Meeting, the village saw:

- 1. The introduction of a 30 m.p.h. speed limit
- 2. The phased introduction of parking restrictions
- 3. The establishment of a Car Parks Company, charged with covenanting all profit to the Common Lands Charity for the benefit of the village

This Strategy is recognised locally and nationally as a classic example of community enterprise, trust and involvement. Revising this successful strategy, for want of an ill-conceived perfection, will cause more harm than good to our village, its environment and all those that enjoy Walberswick for what it is.

Information is available, from various organizations, concerning parking/ obstruction incidents from last year, including photographs of the worst incidents. Any specific concerns regarding any aspect of the Visitor Management Strategy should, and must, be addressed to *your* authority - the Parish Council.

These are my personal views, do not represent formal Council policy and you are fully entitled not to share them. If you do not, I strongly urge you to stand at the next Parish Council election.

BLYTH VALLEY COMPUTER SOCIETY

We are indebted to East Anglian Pharmaceuticals Ltd for our final event of the season. Small groups, spaced over three separate days, were kindly invited to watch their operation from *goods in* through to *orders out*. EAP is the second largest independent pharmaceutical wholesaler in the U.K.

Following an interesting short history of pharmacies in the U.K., we observed orders coming in via their website, the print-out of which is bar-coded and placed in a tray. It then starts an amazing journey by roller conveyor, the bar-code triggering the automatic pick of the required goods and choosing the correct route at each partition of the track.

The distribution depot has just undergone the second phase of modernization making it one of the most up-to-date automated warehouses in the U.K. Order turnaround times are reduced to a minimum, with accuracy of picking and delivery very close to 100%. We were all held spell-bound by the speed and efficiency of their operation, yet they maintain the human touch where machines cannot cope, or are less efficient. Hand sorting is needed where medicines come in awkward shapes and the eye is required for the final inspection before delivery to the correct van. Their fleet of 30 vans delivers twice daily to pharmacies, doctors and hospitals throughout East Anglia, and as far afield as West London and Nottingham.

AGM on 10th May 2004

Alvin Hunt was unanimously re-elected as Chairman to the Parish Council and Robin Buncombe to Vice Chairman. Alvin was also elected as representative to the Village Hall Management Committee and Robin as representative for SALC.

There were two planning applications: Troy, Church Field – for the erection of a two-storey and single-storey extension and the erection of a detached garage (revised scheme) and Beta Cottage, the Green – erection of a single-storey rear extension; roof extension and roof lights to facilitate living accommodation. The Council had no objections to either of these proposals. Planning permission had been refused by SCDC for a new house in the grounds of Westwood, Lodge Road and for a large extension at The Old School, Leveretts Lane. However, permission had been granted for an extension to 2, Lorne cottages and for the construction of dormer windows in the roof of Westwood, Lodge Road. A planning appeal has been submitted to the Secretary of State for the erection of two houses on the land at the Studio, Stocks Lane.

Tractor Bob

The sound of a vintage tractor has not been heard in the village for some time. Tractor Bob died on the 2nd of July 2004.

Robert John Snowden was born in Southwold on the 16th of August 1936. His family had lived in the area for several generations. Snowdens Yard in Southwold is named after his grandfather who sold paraffin and hardware there in the 1900s, and his father was the groundsman on Southwold golf course.

After leaving Reydon School he worked on the land in Suffolk and Essex driving tractors and agricultural machinery, at which he became expert.

In the 1970s he moved to a smallholding in Lodge Road, Walberswick, where he lived in a caravan with his dog, a tame pheasant, ducks and geese. He was a genuine animal lover; dogs were his favourites.

For many years he worked with Ginger Winyard who owned the village shop and numerous smallholdings; they grew vegetables and flowers, which were sold in the shop.

Bob also did gardening work in the village, becoming indispensable to some of his elderly customers. Inside the perennial blue boiler suit and baseball cap was a very kind and helpful person, who never complained about his own problems. He had been a diabetic for forty-five years.

About eleven years ago Bob was persuaded to move to Adams Lane where he lived with helpful and friendly neighbours.





Blyth Valley Computer Society

Our speaker for the first meeting of the new season was Tom Salusbury who is team leader of the Biotech Sector of UK Trade and Investment, a joint project of the Department of Trade and Industry and the Foreign Office. Tom, who lives locally, gave a fascinating talk about the unravelling of the DNA code. Every living cell contains two miles of DNA with 46 chromosomes and 30,000 genes.

Sequencing DNA in the 1980's was painstaking work with pipettes and test tubes but advances in computer technology led to computerised robotics and *laboratories on a chip* techniques able to tackle the enormous amount of testing and calculation needed.

Eighteen countries joined the Human Genome project in 1990 supporting it with public funding. The work was completed two years early in 2003.

The DNA codes sequenced include a round worm, a puffer fish, a weed, a rat and a person (whose identity is secret!). The potential applications of this knowledge include improved diagnosis of disease, individually customised drugs, earlier detection of genetic predispositions to disease, energy sources and environmental applications, forensics, agriculture and livestock breeding.

Our next meeting is at the Village Hall at 7 p.m. on Friday, 12th November. The talk will be about new software that is revolutionising the world of estate agency. It's bound to be fascinating.

News From Southwold Surgery

Following the excellent news of the decision of the Town Council to allow us to build the new Health Centre on their land by the Fire Station, subject to a few caveats, planning is slowly moving on. The next hurdle is to get the Waveney Primary Care Trust (PCT) to agree a high priority for our new development. Having then got that, planning can begin in earnest.

All our patients need to be aware of the change of contractor for the times when the surgery is closed. From 1st Oct. '04, Anglian Medical Services (AMC) will provide the cover. Patients should ring the Surgery in the normal way, the answerphone message will tell you what number to call in emergencies.

There will be no Saturday morning service at the Surgery from Saturday 2nd Oct. '04, onwards. This was an emergency service only, but some patients found it convenient to pick up their medication on Saturday morning. We regret that this will no longer be possible. Remember, two working days is required to process prescriptions, this means that those given to us either by 'phone or posted late Friday or Saturday will not be seen until Monday and will not be ready for collection until late Tuesday. Conversely, those put in on Thursday will not be ready until late Monday.

Please plan ahead for your repeat prescriptions, or you will be disappointed and we do not want that to happen.

Peter Byrne gave our November talk; he lives in Walberswick and is the IT Director for a national firm of estate agents. Peter showed how new technology has changed the whole process of buying and selling houses. 67% of buyers now start with a search on the Internet. Estate agents can match properties to buyer's requirements using their computer databases. Buyers are advised of appropriate properties for sale, immediately they come on the market, by text messaging and email.

Big estate agent companies are now in partnership with legal firms to offer speedier conveyancing, with guaranteed standards of service, through text messaging transaction progress updates as well as secure online access to their own sale or purchase case file on the web.

Peter spoke of the Government's plans to introduce Home Information Packs (HIP's), which is in the final stages before Parliament. The object of the HIP is to make property transactions speedier and therefore reduce the uncertainty of our current system. The HIP, prepared before a property goes on the market, will provide full information to a buyer prior to making an offer rather than after an offer has been accepted; often many weeks later, as it is now. Opinion is divided about the proposed changes.

Peter demonstrated software based on ordnance survey mapping that allows accurate measurement of land and house plot areas throughout the UK. There was some rivalry among members as the exact size of some gardens was calculated.

Planning

Permission had been granted for the erection of a single-storey, first floor extension and a replacement garage at Old School Cottage, Leveretts Lane, subject to the development being carried out in accordance with the plans and information contained in the application. Retrospective planning permission had also been granted for the retention of veranda decking at The Old Yacht Yard. Although Waveney District Council had reported the PC's objections to the Rural Development Committee, and agreed it was a sensitive site, they did not consider the development changed the character of the area.
