# WALBERSWICK COMMON LANDS CHARITY Founded 1901 – Registered Charity No. 206095 CHAIRMAN'S REPORT YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

In last year's report I explained how the challenging local context in Walberswick was putting pressure on the Trustees to ensure that they met their legal obligations by acting solely in the best interests of the Charity and that they adhered strictly to the requirements of the Charity's Scheme and the Charities Act. This year I am pleased to report that the Trustees have grasped the nettle and concluded a detailed review covering all aspects of the Charity's activities, the conclusions of which were reported back to the Village at the Annual Parish Meeting in April 2017. In addition the Charity has been working towards modernising its property agreements and dealing with legacy property issues. However most important of all the Charity has continued to meet its charitable objectives by maintaining the natural environment in our ownership around our Village as well as providing charitable support to individuals and groups within our community.

# Review of activities and policies

The outcome of the review of the Charity's policies with regard to its beneficiary class, both individuals and groups, is summarised in the table below:

#### Natural environment

2016 was a further year of considerable change on Walberswick Common. Working under the supervision of Natural England we continue to clear large portions of gorse and birch in order to encourage the re-growth of heather. The immediate impact of this clearing is always somewhat stark, however the long-term benefits are now clearly visible with open tracts of heather and views across the valley towards Southwold. The positive feedback we have received from residents and visitors is very much appreciated.

The Charity faces a significant threat from flooding to its land adjoining the River Blyth, the area known as Town and Robinson's Marshes. The footpath along the Blyth is also a vital economic artery into the Village. We are working as a member of the Blyth Estuary Group on two projects. The raising and strengthening of the river bank and a new flood gate across Ferry Road linked into the re-built bank by Old Vicarage Cottage. The latter to reduce flood risk to adjoining properties and The Lea. At year-end the Charity held unrestricted funds of £121,427, in large part as a contingency against flood risk. It is hoped that these funds can eventually be used on flood prevention measures as a way of mitigating this risk.

The bridleway through Sandy Lane is a much-loved feature of Walberswick. However in recent years it has suffered from tree die-back, erosion and ivy infestation. A project is underway to restore the 'green tunnel' to the entire length of Sandy Lane. As with the Common, the initial change has been somewhat stark. The project will be monitored over the coming year, with the necessity of new planting being assessed in autumn 2017.

#### Grants to beneficiaries and community projects

The following table shows grants made from un-restricted funds during 2016 compared to 2015.

Overall grants increased by 8.7%. The reduction in grants to Groups is due to the annual grant to Walberswick Village Hall being made in the 2017, rather than 2016 year. This delay was due to the Trustees reaching agreement with the Village Hall Management Committee that the grant would be used for a qualifying charitable purpose. Our largest charitable donation was once again to Sole Bay Care Fund, an excellent charity that provides in-home assistance and end of life care to Walberswick inhabitants.

The increase in grants to schools is as a result of a change in policy from providing educational support to individuals, to the schools themselves. Following the review of Charity practices it was no longer possible to provide educational support to individuals without first assessing them on the basis of need and hardship. Instead support is now given to schools on a per-capita basis, with the schools informing Trustees of the specific projects on which the grants will be used.

Examples of grants and projects which the Charity has supported during 2016 or which are ongoing are:

- A project to provide access to Walberswick beach for those with limited mobility.
- Improvements to the Communal Beach Hut.
- A contribution of 50% to the cost of restoring the Walberswick slipway.
- Construction of 'Tony's Hide' in Bennett's Drift, a bird-hide dedicated to the memory of the late Tony Lancaster.
- A one-third contribution to establish a 20 mph speed limit throughout Walberswick.
- Projects to reduce flood risk.

#### Walberswick Car Parks Limited (WCPL)

WCPL is a company controlled by the Charity. It is responsible for operation of two car parks on the Charity's land. The principal objective is to improve traffic management and safety within the Village. The secondary benefit is that the car parks provide income which support the Charity's objectives.

In 2016 over 33,000 cars used the WCPL car parks. On busy days this resulted in congestion and a number of incidents. In 2017 the Directors of WCPL plan to move to Pay & Display parking. This should free up the parking attendants from taking money to instead focus on traffic management and being ambassadors for Walberswick. In addition traffic lights are to be trialled on the single-track Cliff Field bridge which becomes a bottle-neck in peak periods.

#### 2016 Accounts

The total un-restricted income of the Charity for 2016 was £70,294, an increase of 14% on 2015. Of this income 30% was from WCPL with the remainder coming from property related activities. Expenditure on administration and maintenance increased by 85% to £34,347 when compared to 2015. This was in large part due to the cost of legal and survey advice relating to the review of the Charity's activities, modernising property agreements and resolving legacy property issues. These advisory costs are likely to continue at a high level into the 2017 year as further legacy issues are dealt with.

During 2016 the Charity received restricted income of £26,048 against expenditure of £32,093, with £6,045 of that expenditure being met from restricted reserves.

At the year-end restricted reserves stood at £141,751 and un-restricted reserves at £129,027. The restricted reserves being for defined purposes, such as our Stewardship Agreement and the Track & Manor Field agreement.

#### Conclusion

I would like to acknowledge the contribution made by our Trustees during 2016. To my knowledge the Charity has never had a more diverse group of Trustees. That diversity creates a healthy contestability of ideas, leading to lively debate on occasions! All of which has helped shape a set of policies and procedures that should stand the Charity in good stead for years to come. As well as ensuring that the Charity continues to be a force for good in our Village.

Independent Examiners Report to the Trustees of the Walberswick Common Lands Charity No.206095
